Seed Grain
Distribution

The provincial Department of Agriculture has released the following statement: "Believing that a great many farmers in the province are anxious about their seed grain requirements for the present season, I would say that the government has undertaken to supply the demand as far as they possibly can. "There are upwards of forty-five (45) thousand bushels already ordered by the people and we are hopeful of being able to supply the remainder of the province. "The government is giving credit for the seed grain. It is absolutely necessary on fifty bushels of oats to each farmer. There will be a form sent out to each applicant for him to fill out and return to the Department. This will constitute a lien on the land, and we will then see that his grain is supplied to him. "We are arranging at different centres that certain parties who are Commissioners to take affidavits may be seen by those parties if they wish any assistance in having those forms filled out. These names are as follows: J. A. Bernard, Tignish; J. F. Elliott, Alberton; J. MacKay, Coleman; William Burleigh, Ellerslie; Fraser MacDonald, Bloomfield; A. J. Matheson, O'Leary. "The price of the oats will be uniform, namely 80c per bushel. "There are considerable quantities of oats being offered in the market. A fair sum per bushel at railway centres in three (3) bushel bags, if they are re-cleaned, and of objectionable weed seed, under the inspection of the Inspector engaged by the Department. "We would strongly urge, where possible, that parties obtain their requirements from private sources. We have engaged a seed inspector to check over all grain going out."

TIRANA, Albania, April 27—King Ahmed Zog and the youthful Hungarian Countess who became their court tonight at a honeymoon palace on Durazzo Bay. "The 42 year old sovereign and his 22 year old bride were acclaimed as they left Tirana to drive the 25 miles to Durazzo after the short, civil ceremony. "They were followed by a string of automobiles bearing officials and guests who accompanied the royal pair to a palace high up on a cliff overlooking the Adriatic Sea. "The Queen Geraldine, the former Countess Geraldine Apponyi, found awaiting her a dainty private conveyance hanging almost over the bay. "As a wedding gift, Mohammedan King Zog promised to build his Catholic bride a Catholic chapel in the palace. He also granted her request that she be permitted to choose her ladies in waiting from among Hungarian friends.

Subsidies To Municipalities Stevens' Plan

(By The Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, April 27—A system of Dominion subsidies to municipalities based on tax collections on real estate, was urged in the House of Commons today by Hon. H. H. Stevens (Recon., Kootenay East) during debate on the Government's relief legislation. "I think the Federal Government," he said, "could and should offer to pay in the form of a subsidy to every municipality in Canada a sum equal to 25 per cent of the taxes derived from real estate on the condition the municipalities will not increase the assessment rate or the assessment over a period of years. "The subsidy would act as an impetus to a nation-wide housing and construction program which the former Conservative cabinet minister considered impossible with existing high taxes on real estate. "Last year, the appropriation, which will be presented in supplementary estimates after the bill is passed, was \$35,000,000, but in the debate Thomas Church (Con. Tor.) on-to-Broadway voiced protest that no relief was afforded the municipalities. The Toronto member accused the Government of waste and extravagance in setting up commissions and said it had done nothing for industrial workers. "The Church criticized the Government's tariff policy as having the effect of losing the home market for Canadian industry. In the cities and towns this aggravated unemployment conditions.

TOY BALLOON MAKES 13,000 MILE FLIGHT

Released At Montreal Balloon Is Found By Singapore Chinaman.

VERDUN, Que., April 27—(CP)—Frankly confounded, scientists withheld comment tonight on the reported 13,000-mile flight of a nickel balloon from a schoolyard in this Montreal suburban city to Singapore, Straits Settlement. "Chemists at McGill University expressed surprise at such a flight, while students of Verdun High School hurriedly subscribed \$25 to reward Thangun Lee, "a Chinese old man," who sent word of the balloon's arrival in Singapore. "The airmail letter, postmarked at Singapore, April 11, was received today by science teacher L.F. Bennett who helped four of his pupils fill the little green bag with hydrogen on the eve of a school holiday key game March 1. The science boys, wishing to mark the occasion of a game between pupils and teachers, had Mr. Bennett fill the balloon and send it on its way. "Nothing more was heard of the flight which started close to the St. Lawrence River, until a letter arrived for Mr. Bennett. It said: (quoted as written): "My wife found your balloon this morning. We saw your address on the note it was torn and I could not write on it. If you sent me money I will send the green balloon to you. It was found near Killiney Road. I am a Chinese old man. "Thangun Lee." "McGill authorities said "great care" would be required in inflating a cheap balloon with hydrogen which ordinarily loses its buoyancy over recently, leaving four holes, each about two inches deep, near the neck. "But the pupils gave no thought to the possible difficulties encountered by their flying advertisement. They gathered sufficient funds to send the letter, five pounds sterling as a reward, and a request to return their history-making balloon.

Tariff System Is Criticized

(By The Canadian Press)

TORONTO, April 27—Traffic directly benefits a minority of Canadian production and less than a quarter of those employed in manufacturing and agriculture, the Rowell Commission was told today by the Canadian Importers and Traders Association. "The Association claimed the national tariff policy benefited chiefly the few central provinces, at the expense of the rest of the country. It said 555,000 workers were engaged in manufacturing in Canada in 1936, while 533,000 were in industries directly benefited by the tariff, and 1,128,000 were in agriculture. "Similarly, manufacturing production was \$1,016,623,000 while industries not directly benefited by the tariff produced goods worth \$1,378,097,000. "The Association urged sufficient lowering of the tariff "eliminate some glaring inequities." "The Canadian Chain Store Association complained against taxation which "discriminated" against chain stores in several provinces, contending this was an infringement by the provinces of a Dominion power to regulate trade and commerce. "The British-Israel-World Federation filed a submission urging adoption of the divine system of government and economics outlined in the Bible. Its suggestions included abolition of provincial legislatures, election of a central governing body and appointment of the Prime Minister by the King. "The commission later heard the Ontario Municipal Association and the National Construction Council present their views for reducing the municipal tax load, especially on real estate.

TREATY MEETS WITH APPROVAL

De Valera Says Independence Now Recognized.

DUBLIN, April 27—(CP)—The Dail Eireann lower house of the Eire Parliament, today gave first reading to six bills which will implement the Anglo-Eire agreements signed Monday. "William T. Cosgrave, opposition leader, announced his Fine Gael Party supported the accord and declared it was a pity such a friendship pact had not been made six years ago. "He spoke after Prime Minister De Valera, who signed the accord, declared the independence of Eire now had been recognized unconditionally by Great Britain. "Meanwhile the Senate, in its first session following its recent election, chose Sean Gibbons, member of Mr. De Valera's Fianna Fail Party as its chairman. He defeated Seamus Hickey of the Fine Gael. "Dr. Douglas Hyde voted for the Fine Gael candidate. Shortly afterwards Mr. Hyde formally withdrew from the Senate in view of the unanimous nomination tendered him by both Fianna Fail and Fine Gael to become the first President of Eire. "Mr. De Valera was vigorously applauded by his supporters in the lower house but the opposition remained silent. "He that does good to another man, does also good to himself.—Seneca.

Two Ferries For Island Service This Summer

OTTAWA, April 28—Two ferries will operate simultaneously between Prince Edward Island and the New Brunswick mainland this summer. Transport Minister Howe announced to the Commons Railway Committee today. "Formerly only one ferry was used, the second lying up at Cassco, first on the job between Tormentine, N. B., to Borden, P. E. I. "The Minister made his statement in reply to complaints voiced by W. A. Walsh (Con. Mount Royal) against slowness of the ferry service which operated as a discouragement to tourists, he said.
