THE STRIKE RECORD OF CANADA ABOUT SAME.

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—The preliminary estimate of the number of labor disputes in October, issued by the department of labor, shows that the number of strikes was about as great as that recorded during the same month of last year, although there was no material change from conditions during the previous month of the present year. The disputes of coal miners on Vancouver Island continued throughout October, this being the only dispute in which a great number of men were involved. About twenty-one disputes were in existence, ten of which commenced during the month. Upwards of 4,300 employees were involved in these disputes, which caused a loss of about 98,000 working days.

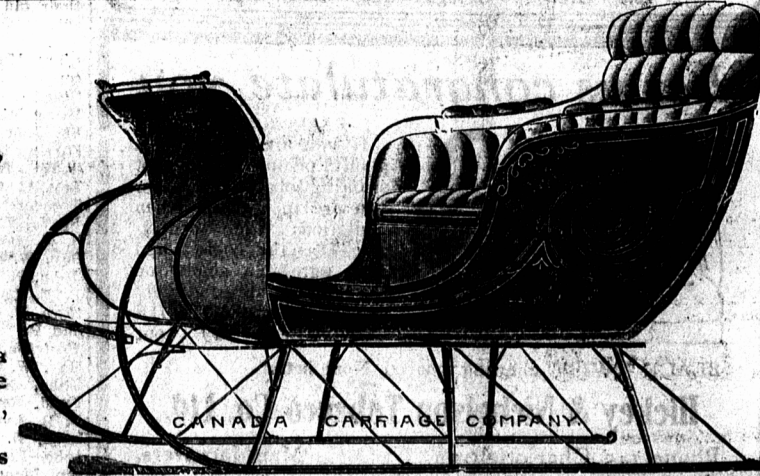
