

Nine-run Uprising In 5th Gives Anchors 11-4 Win Over Rovers

A nine-run uprising in the fifth inning of a seven-inning game at the Memorial Field diamond last night gave the high flying Anchors a 11-4 victory over the Rovers and kept their undefeated record intact in the City Baseball League.

Eight hits, a struck batter and a walk exploded on the Rovers in a fateful fifth inning and when the last out was made thirteen batters had walked to the plate and nine runs were scored.

Up to this moment the game had all the earmarks of a nip and tuck. The west-end crowd yielded its first leading two-run lead to their north-end rivals, but themselves garnered single markers in the second and third innings.

McLennan and MacLean led the Anchor upsurge. The former hit a brace of doubles and a triple to drive in three runs, while the latter hit a single followed by a four circuit blow with two on.

Spj Ready hurled six-hit ball for the Anchors holding the Rovers to four scattered runs, two in the first and two in the sixth.

The heavyweight championship fight pictures currently showing at the local theatres show the action or rather lack of action in the recent Louis-Walcott go.

It wasn't much of a fight until the Louis lightning struck in the 11th. But that was no fault of the champion, who through the years has always moved forward to search out an opponent and blast him out of the way. Walcott fought the only way he knew how, and tried to duplicate his more successful performance of last December and managed to floor Louis once.

In one phrase Walcott summed up the story of Louis' mastery of one challenger after another: "I made a mistake but I don't know what it was," said the Bomber's latest victim. There is a familiar ring to that remark, and it may well go down as one of the immortal ring sayings such as Dempsey's famous crack after the Turney fight: "I just forgot to duck honey."

From 1934 all but one man has mapped out a plan of attack designed to beat Joe Louis, given of their best but made a "mistake" one time or another against the world's champion. In some cases the mistake was to have ever entered the same ring with him. Somehow was the one exception, but in one furious attack Louis lashed him into defeat to even the score.

Another world's championship fight is over, and with it perhaps the end of an era. Louis has announced he is finished with the ring. In his own words: "This was my last fight." Some are inclined to doubt that he will withstand the lure of more money or the demands of the fight fraternity for "just one more." But all alois' Louis has maintained to news-papers that he was retiring after this one and if he sticks to his decision he bows out after erasing what some considered was a blot on the greatest record of any heavyweight champion in history.

Louis has been a credit to boxing and a credit to his race. His conduct has done much to counteract prejudice, opines Dink (Gazette) Carroll. He has held the heavyweight title longer than any other champion. He has been a popular as well as a great fighter. He never refused to meet a challenger (something which can't be said of never had an alibi. He was a model, not only for men of his own profession but for those competing in other sports.

Some months ago, Harry Markson released the following from the 20th Century Sporting Club's press bureau: "There are many persons in boxing who believe that Joe Louis is the greatest heavyweight of all time. They base their opinion on his unequalled record of title defenses, on the fact that he has never avoided a legitimate challenger, on the fact that he unhesitatingly accepted a return match with every opponent who made things close for him the first time, and the manner in which he disposed of his challengers. Statistics covering the entire Joe Louis boxing career, and the complete careers of all previous heavyweight champions, would seem to substantiate the opinion of Louis admirers."

Louis has held the title 11 years, which is one year longer than John Lawrence Sullivan reigned. Jack Jeffries, Jack Johnson and Jack Dempsey held on for seven years. Jim Corbett for five, Tommy Burns and Jess Willard for three. No other champion remained in office more than two years. Fitzsimmons and Johnson were 37 years old when they lost the title. Willard was 35 and Sullivan was 34. Louis today is 34. Along with Gene Tunney, he is the only champion to retire undefeated.

But it's apparent to all that he is far from being the old Louis. Walcott gave him a close fight in their first meeting and almost got away from him last Friday night. And it must be remembered that Walcott was barred from New Jersey rings for a few years ago because of lack of skill and that, while claiming to be 34 years old, he is actually 38 (some say they can prove it) and the father of six children. On the face of it, he had no business in the ring with a man like the old Louis.

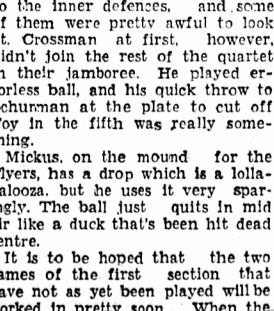

Kid Howard Wins Decision At Halifax; McCloskey In Draw

HALIFAX, June 29—(CP)—Dick (Kid) Howard, Maritime lightweight champion, came off the floor to earn a unanimous 10-round decision over Tony Riccio of Boston at the Halifax Arena tonight. Howard weighed 130½, Riccio 129.

In the preliminaries Blaine Hayden, 140, of Springhill, N.S., knocked out Frank Garnier, 140½, of Halifax at 2:39 of the third round. He broke Garnier's nose.

Keith Paris, 127, of New Glasgow, N.S., earned a four-round decision over Jimmy Steeves, 127, of Truro, N.S.; and Cobey McCloskey, 153, of Charlottetown, and Ossie Farrell, 160½, of Halifax, drew after four rounds.

It was announced from ringside that George Ross of West Bay Road, N.S., would fight Roger Why-not of Mahone Bay, N.S., in a feature bout of a card here July 13.

Ross was introduced as "Canadian middleweight champion," as he is regarded in the Maritimes since he defeated Len Wadsworth of Hamilton two months ago at Glouce Bay, N.S.

Halifax Player Leads N. S. Golf Tourney

DARTMOUTH, N. S., June 29—(CP)—Eddie Crowell of Halifax's Ashburn Club took a one-stroke lead in the second round of the Nova Scotia amateur golf championship tournament today, replacing A. W. (Pud) Carter also of Halifax as the pace-setter.
