THE SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE FREDERICTON, July 12. - The opening meeting of the summer school of science was held at Fredericton last evening and was largely attended. President Starratt was in the chair. Mayor Thomas extended a hearty welcome to the school. He was supported by Chancellor Jones, of the University of New Brunswick; Dr. Weddall, a member of the city school board; Rev. Mr. Stebbings; Rev. Mr. McLaughlin, and T. B. Kidner. Responses were made by Dr. G. U. Hay, of St. John, and Superintendent A. H. MacKay, of Halifax. The tone of the meeting was most enthusiastic. The beauty of the scenery, the advantages that Fredericton offered for the study of science, the hospitality of the citizens, were all commended. Special mention was made of the fact that upwards of thirty scholarships were offered for competition. The enrollment is 260, which exceeds all previous enrolments at the opening of the school. The classes are all well filled. The indications are that this will be the very best session of the school. LONDON, July 12—Arthur Newton who was found guilty of professional misconduct in his defence of the wife murderer Dr Hawley H. Crippen, by a commission of the Law Society, was today suspended from practice for one year, and ordered by the division court to pay the costs of the inquiry. Newton was alleged to have abused his privilege as a lawyer by aiding and abetting Horatio W. Bottomly, editor of a weekly publication and member of Parliament for the south today. Mr. Crippen's public false statements regarding the case, and also to have aided the Daily Chronicle to give publicity to similar untruths. Justice Darling in announcing the decision of the court said that the conduct of the defendant was inconsistent with public advantage. Crippen he said, was not defended as he should have been with a view purely to his defence. His case had been conducted largely for the purpose of making a copy for the newspapers, which subscribed money for the defence. That a solicitor should lend himself to such practice was a very grave offense the Justice said, and added, that in his opinion the newspapers connected with the affairs deserved punishment equally with Newton. Newton gave notice of an appeal from the judgment of the court. It was decided to accept the offer of Goodale, the Airship man, for daily flights. GREAT FLEET GATHERED AT CAPE PROVINCE TOWN, July 10—Having experienced a day of almost abject quiet as compared with the whirl, glitter and bustle which attended the landing of 2500 pleasure-seeking sailors and 1800 sight-seeing Boston tourists yesterday noon, Provincetown is tonight refreshed and ready for a resumption of stirring street and harbor scenes on the morrow. Few ships' men other than a handful of orderlies and many of the line officers who have families occupying cottages here at present, landed here today.
