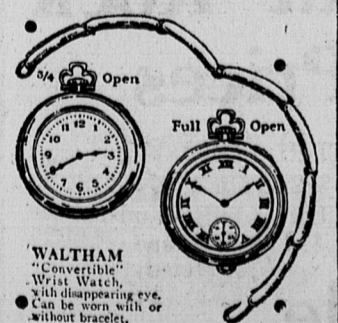

Master Frank Acorn, 163 Great George Street, City, has received the following letter from Serg. Bonnell who is suffering from gassing and is now in the King's Can. Hospital in England.
King's Can. Hosp. Bushy Park London
27-17-17

Dear Master Acorn:—On Xmas day all the soldiers in this and other hospitals were presented with a large Xmas stocking filled with all manner of good things sent by the boys and girls of Canada. I was very proud that the stocking which I received was from a little boy of Charlottetown—my home town. I saw a number of other stockings, from Charlottetown boys and girls, given out here. It made me feel that after all I was not so far from home, and that the little boys and girls of P. E. I. did not forget their soldierly friends. This is a special Hospital for cases of gas poisoning, the majority of which, like my own, have been brought on from the after effects of gassing. I hope that you will enjoy your first year at school and, by careful study, win that success which is open to all boys and girls who have the ambition to service. It must indeed be a great pleasure for you to have your papa home again. Only those who have been over here can realize how much it must mean to him to be back with his loved ones. Thanking you again for your thoughtfulness and assuring you and all your little friends that the Canadian soldiers in Hospital greatly appreciate the kindness which prompted you to send these gifts.
