ence to the time of completion. The contractor has failed to complete and hand over the building within the time specified, which is claimed to be due to the failure of the parties, he contracted with for supplies, to furnish the same according to the agreement.

All of the other contracts, depending upon the progress of the main building for their completion, have kept pace with the progress of that structure. The boring of the well presented unexpected difficulties. The work was commenced early in June, and it was expected that the well would be completed in about two weeks. The contract calls for a six inch bore hole, from the surface, carrying this diameter to a depth of four hundred feet if necessary. At two hundred feet from the surface a formation of soft marl was encountered, and a cave occurred which securely held the drill. Some time was spent in a fruitless attempt to extract the drill. Then another bore hole was commenced, and after proceeding the same depth, two hundred feet, another cave in occurred and after an effort to extract the drill, it was abandoned. As it was then the last of November, and cold weather had set in, the contractor decided to suspend operations for the winter. The work on the well will be resumed in the early Spring, commencing with a twelve inch bore hole, and gradually decreasing the diameter following the hole the entire depth with iron piping telescoped. By following this method no difficulty is anticipated, and the well should be completed next Spring. No money has been paid on account of this contract.

Owing to the delay in driving the well, the Power House could not be built, and this prevented the Lunt Moss Co., from installing the system under their contract. They will complete the work in the Spring as soon as the well is located, and the Power House constructed.

The Sewage Disposal system is in course of installation, and the work is progressing satisfactorily. The present state of the work is as follows:

The main building and the pavilions are erected, and the outside practically completed. Some work has been done on the interior. Your Commissioners expect to open the Sanatorium sometime next July.

Calculating on opening the Sanatorium before the close of the year, your commissioners employed, at a salary of two thousand dollars per year, Dr. W. Miles Garrison, late of the State of Maine Sanatorium at Hebron, Maine, as Medical Superintendent, his salary to commence sometime between the fifteenth of November and the end of the present year. The fact that the Sanatorium was not completed does not relieve your Commissioners from the responsibility of carrying out their arrangements with Dr. Garrison.

The Commission respectfully suggests that, during the Winter months, Dr. Garrison may be employed delivering lectures throughout the country on the prevention and treatment of Tuberculosis, and that the vote of six hundred dollars, appropriated by the Legislature at its last session for Educational propaganda in connection with Tuberculosis in this Province, be applied to that purpose.

The financial statement is herewith attached.

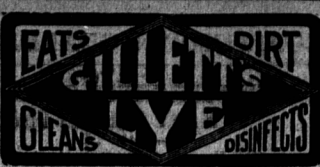
