I. She leaves her husband and three daughters. The latter are the Misses Mary, Constance and Jean. The Misses Mary and Constance were to have been graduated this summer from Mount Allison University, Canada, but they were recalled to Japan on account of the illness of their mother. Miss Jean Chappell was already in Tokio. The sympathy of a wide circle of relatives and friends in Charlottetown will go out to the family in their far away home.
