The Halifax Chronicle of June 25th says: A. Ernest Ings, barrister, of Charlottetown, is at the Halifax. Mr. Ings expresses himself as well pleased with the new I. C. R. train service. The new Sydney service, he says, is a boon to Islanders, as passengers leaving Sydney in the morning can reach the Island that evening, something hitherto unknown. The midday train from Halifax connects with the Charlottetown boat at Pictou, and thus Islanders have the forenoon to transact business in Charlottetown.

THE people will be pleased to learn that the La Grande Duchesse has been placed on the Eastern route and on Monday evening next will arrive in port. In referring to her first trip to Halifax the Halifax Chronicle of 25th says: The big Plant liner La Grande Duchesse arrived in port at four o'clock yesterday afternoon on her first trip of the season with nearly 300 passengers and about 80 more than she carried on her first trip last year. She left Boston at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon and came along at the rate of 15½ knots. Off Cape Sable early yesterday morning fog was met and this delayed her slightly.

Her officers are the same as last year with the exception of the Chief Engineer, this position being now held by Mr. McGruder, formerly second engineer. Captain Peter Hanlon, who is in command, was warmly greeted by his many friends. Purser Elgin was also at his post as smiling and obliging as ever. Chief Stewart Newman was also on deck. During the past winter the Duchesse has been running between New York and Savannah and only reached Boston on Thursday from New York.

On this trip the "a la carte" system was inaugurated in the dining saloon and found to work most satisfactorily. There is every promise of a big tourist season so Manager H. L. Chipman, who returned by the steamer informed a Chronicle reporter. Every room is taken up on the Duchesse for the next half dozen trips ahead. A waiting list had to be opened in Boston.

**Railroad Improvement in Sydney.**
