IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN DICKIESON.

A prominent citizen of Summerside passed away on Thursday last in the person of Mr. John Dickieson age 69 years, after an illness of some months which he bore with that patience and resignation to the Divine Will which characterized his whole life. For many years he has been prominent in civic life and his place in the community will be hard to fill. He took a keen interest in the welfare and betterment of Summerside, not only materially, but morally and socially, and served a number of terms as a member of the Town Council. A native of Wilmot, in early life he invented a fanning mill and started in business with a factory at Ross Corner. It proved a big success and Dickieson's Fanner became one of the best known pieces of farm machinery in the province. About 30 years ago he removed to Summerside, continuing the manufacture of his fanner there and also acting as agent for machinery and monumental work. He was a great student of nature a lover of flowers and a splendid amateur gardener, usually winning a number of prizes at the Prince County Exhibition. His death will be deplored by all classes. There are left to mourn a widow, three brothers and four sisters, as follows:— Messrs A. E. Dickieson, of Springfield; H. R. Dickieson, Reynolds, N. Dakota; Reuben Dickieson of Wilmot; Mrs. E. Hardman and Mrs. Lester Jennings, of Paw Paw, Mich; Mrs. Bath, Grand Forks, N. Dakota, and Mrs. J. Orr of Nelson, B. C. The funeral took place Saturday at 3 p. m. to the Wilmot Cemetery.

JOHN C. HOBBS

The death occurred in Charlottetown at nine o'clock yesterday morning of Mr. John C. Hobbs, aged seventy-nine years, a well known and highly respected citizen. The deceased was a very skilful cabinet maker. He was at one time associated with his father the late John Hobbs in the furniture and undertaking business in the building subsequently occupied by the late W. E. Dawson. He was later with Mark Wright, and the late John Newson. Mr. Hobbs enjoyed good health until June last when he was obliged to give up work. He leaves to mourn besides his widow, the following sons and daughters; Frank, Mrs. John H. Saunders, Charlottetown, Mrs. Fred. Prowse, Murray Harbor, Mrs. Edythe Inman, Colorado, and Mrs. Annie Calbeck, Boston. One brother James Hobbs, of Boston and three sisters, Mrs. William Wright, Charlottetown, Mrs. Andrew Stiggins, Texas, Mrs. Freeland, London, Ont., survive him. The deceased was one of the oldest Masons on the Island and filled various high positions in connection with the Order.

He was made a Master Mason in St. John's Lodge No. 1 in December, 1859; subsequently he became a member of Alexander Royal Arch Chapter and Prince Edward Preceptory No. 25.



WORLD'S RECORDS ARE ESTABLISHED

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y.—Two new world's race records for a trotting stallion were established here Friday by St. Frisco driven by E. E. Greers, when he trotted two heats in 2.04 1/2 and 2.01 1/2, defeating Mabel Trask in a special trotting event for a \$1,000 purse. His time in the second heat broke the former stallion trotting race record of 2.02 held jointly by The Harvester and Peter Volo. The two heats were the fastest ever trotted by a stallion in a race. The time of the second heat by quarters was 31 1/2, 1.01 1/2, 1.32, 2.03 1/2.

In the first heat Mabel Trask was beaten only a head in a driving finish and she lost the second heat by a scant half length. Cox trailed to the home stretch in both heats.

The 2.17 trot unfinished from Thursday was won by North Spur in straight heats. Little Frank D. was the winner of "The Directum First" 2.05 pace, although Savoy won the final heat.




