W. H. LESLIE, Kensington, J. H. McCormack, St. George's, and F. T. Morrow returned from the Sussex Dairy School on the 22nd inst and report being well pleased with the course and commend the efficiency of the staff of instructors. The Department is to be congratulated on having so competent a staff. It should do much to raise the standard quality of cheese and butter of the Lower Provinces, and makers should feel very grateful to the Dominion Department for contributing toward the expenses of makers from the Island attending the school, as all expense of attending was formerly borne by the makers themselves. The students were shown some very fine herds of milk cows of pure bred Gurnsey, also Ayrshire, owned by Patee & Sons who have large herds of very fine stock and have on hand Berkshire and Yorkshire swine, Leicester sheep and fowls. McIntyre Bros have also a fine herd of Ayrshires and are also good producers. They have on hand pure bred stock of both sexes, and as Mr. Morrow has seen some of each herd milked he can speak for the quality of them. Large quantities of butter is being made in a number of factories during the winter which enables patrons to raise young s'ock to good advantage. The farmers feed considerable milk producing food such as bran, cotton seed meal, etc., which they consider can be fed profitably to milk cows. Quite a number of hand separators are in use, leaving the sweet skim milk at home for feeding where it is most valuable for the young stock. The cost of milk hauling is reduced when only the cream is delivered at the creameries. That system of gathering cream requires great care, such as cool the cream down as low as possible in order to have the desired result. Dairy men on the Island should decide to have milk the year round and keep the factories running instead of running for a few months as has been done in past seasons. By having part of the herd fresh in the fall so calves can be raised during the winter when they thrive best and by testing associations being formed so as to weed out the unprofitable cows and raising the calves from the best cows the necessary encouragement will be to promote dairying in the proper manner.
