The Annual Meeting Held Yesterday in the B. I. Society Hall.

### IMPORTANT REPORTS AND PAPERS READ.

The President's Address—Father Burke on Forestry—  
The San Jose Scale Discussed—Officers to be Elected this Morning—Profs. Macoun and Robertson in Attendance—The Former to Deliver an Address this Morning.

The first session of the Annual Meeting of the Fruit Growers Association took place at 2.30 yesterday afternoon. The attendance was not large, owing to the unfavorable weather. After the reading and passing of the minutes of last meeting the president, H. A. Stewart, read his annual report which upon motion of Rev. A. E. Burke was adopted and ordered to be set down for discussion at the commencement of this morning's session.

As we look back over those five years, we may well ask ourselves what are the results. Have the horticultural interests of our Province been advanced through our efforts? Are we growing better fruit? Have we more knowledge in reference to the varieties best suited to our soil and climate? Have we failed in any particular, through lack of attention, courage and energy? Such are some of the questions which present themselves to the thoughtful horticulturist. Standing on the opening year of the 20th century, and taking a retrospective view of the last of the 19th, the five which comprise our work as an Association, I think I can safely say that progress and improvement at least, to some extent, have crowned our efforts, giving encouragement and hope for the future. Not the members alone, but others have been benefited by coming indirectly within its influence. As the results of our work are not for ourselves alone, but also for those who follow us, we should look well to the construction, to the foundation we lay, displaying courage in surmounting difficulties, which are sure to arise. It is the cement of character that neutralizes disadvantages and overcomes obstacles. It is this that enables us when our efforts fail to try again.

The past year I am glad to say was a good one for fruit in the Province. Apples, plums and also small fruit were an abundant crop, wherever proper care and attention were bestowed upon them. As a result fewer apples were imported from the sister provinces. Growers at times found it difficult to dispose profitably of the earlier varieties. Often they were a glut upon the market. The careless manner in which much of the fruit is marketed is responsible I think in a marked degree for much of the disaster.
