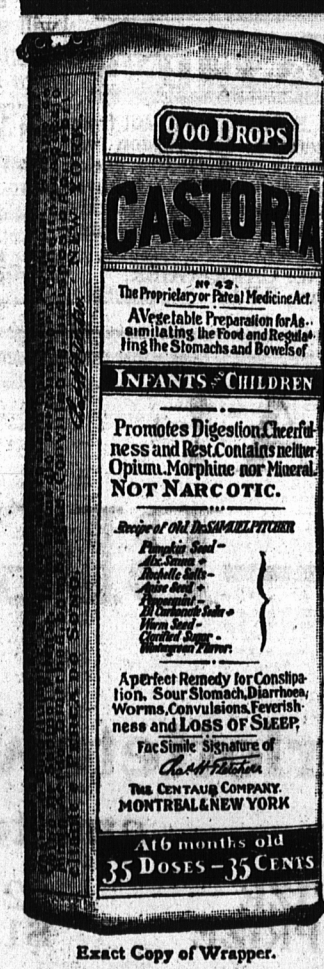

IN MEMORIAM

H. V. DESROCHE.

A prominent and highly respected resident of Miscouche passed away on Sunday evening last in the person of Mr. H. V. DesRoche. The deceased who was one of the pioneer residents of Miscouche was 72 years of age at the time of his death. He had conducted a general store in the village for many years. He was also a Justice of the Peace and at the last session of the Legislature was employed as official Engraving Clerk. About a month ago he was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital, suffering from cancer of the stomach, but the best medical skill was unable to arrest the progress of the disease. Two weeks later he was taken home to await the inevitable end which he did with calm fortitude, and exemplary patience. He leaves to mourn an abounding wife, three daughters and four sons, namely, the Misses Irene and Rose in Boston, and Miss Marie at home, Cyrus and Felix in Boston, Joachim at home and John B. at Summerside. The funeral took place yesterday morning and was largely attended, the service being held in St. John the Baptist's Church, and interment being made in the adjoining cemetery. C
