### IN SOUTH AFRICA.

It is a strange fact that since the occupation of the Boer capitals and the practical subjugation of the two republics, the most frequent attacks have been made upon the British, especially of late, in Cape Colony itself. It will be remembered that in the earlier stages of the war a general rising of the Dutch population at the Cape was feared. It did not take place, however, the Dutch farmers generally maintaining, outwardly, a passive but sullen loyalty. No doubt many of the young men secretly joined the Boer forces in the field, but among the heads of households in Cape Colony there was a general attitude of submission to British authority.

Since the war passed its crucial stage the conditions in Cape Colony seem to have grown worse. There are sudden attacks and surprises of British outposts, railways are cut and in some cases convoys have been captured. Dewet and others have made frequent raids into the Colony, and have, after appearing in the Colony, developed a much stronger force than that with which they entered. One explanation that has been offered is that the young Boers from the Cape who served during the war, have largely returned to their homes and that these are really the active spirits in the attacks and depredations that are being carried on. It is thought they go out at night meeting together by arrangement, and having accomplished their object return secretly to their homes, and conceal their arms. Only in this way can the frequent disappearances of considerable forces be accounted for.

If this theory is correct it will serve in part to account for the manner in which pursuit is eluded so frequently, and how it is that Boer commandoes are one day active and the next day have disappeared only to re-appear and commit other outrages and depredations at a later time. It is not pleasant to find that the Dutch population in Cape Colony remains secretly rebellious, and apparently welcomes and assists every raid made by Dewet and others from across the Orange River.

Sir Louis Davies is expected in Charlottetown on or about the 15th instant. The reassembling of the Ministers at the capital and some important Cabinet meetings to be held in the near future, it is understood have prevented Sir Louis' return to the Island at the earlier date he had first intended.

A valued subscriber in Regina in renewing his subscription sends THE GUARDIAN copies of a circular issued by the Regina Board of Trade. He says "the oropnow maturing is certainly a wonder and will require a great number of hands to harvest. The Board of Trade circular enclosed directs attention to the advantages of a Regina district, "its heavy clay soils that yield a crop in any season; good water, good marketing facilities, schools, churches and social advantages." The free homesteads of are being rapidly taken up but a few still remain. Railway lands can be purchased at from three to five dollars an acre.
