A request has been received asking for a Guardian of March 15th containing the remarks made by Mr. W. Russell Rogers of Alberton on the presentation of the Cup donated by him for the Intermediate Championship of Prince County and won by the Crystals, hence the publication of his address herewith:

MR. RUSSELL ROGER'S ADDRESS

Ladies and Gentlemen: It affords me great pleasure I am sure to say a few words to you on this occasion. After seeing the game played here to-night, my interest and enthusiasm has been greatly increased in hockey and I think I am voicing here the sentiment of all the people that this game was one of the greatest exhibitions of hockey that has been played here for a long time.

The players did their very best, played clean sportsmanlike hockey and after all that is what counts. Inquiring concerning the Summerside lineup, we find some of the old boys that have brought fame and hockey honors to their town. In the good old days when Summerside was playing senior hockey, I used to listen with great interest to the broadcasts of their games with the Abbies and other teams. Summerside has always had a good team. This year by defeating Berlin, they are undisputed champions of Eastern Prince County and become eligible to play off for the cup I am presenting. Alberton has always been noted for its splendid hockey teams and this year proves no exception. This team has won the championship of Western Prince County and knowing the material of the teams you have played with and defeated, I feel the title that you have won deserves great credit. You have accomplished a feat that the town of Alberton should be proud of. No other town in Prince County, excepting Summerside, has contributed more to good hockey than the town of Alberton. By defeating Wellington Batters you earned the right to meet Summerside in the finals for this cup. To promote and encourage Prince County, I am presenting this cup which will be emblematic of the champion intermediate hockey team for this County. It will be played for yearly, under rules and regulations set forth in the gift of the cup. To the captain of the winning team, I present this cup with congratulations and trust that another year you will add more laurels and to the losing team better luck next year.

BUTTERSCOTCH APPLE ROLL (HOT)

Make syrup of 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon butter, and cook 5 minutes in cake pan. Make biscuit dough of 1 cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon sugar, pinch salt, 1/4 teaspoon shortening, 1/4 cup milk. Roll on floured board, cover with 2 tart apples, chopped, and roll,

squeezing the ends. Slice carefully, place out side down in the hot syrup, dot each piece with butter and cinnamon, and bake in hot oven until apples are soft. Serve with cream.
