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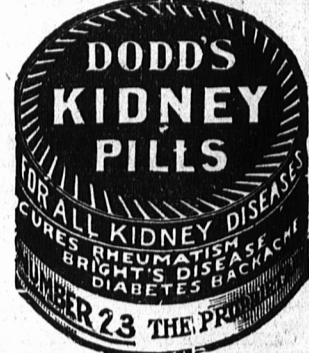

## WOUNDED ISLANDER MEETS BROTHER IN LONDON

Mr. Robert C. MacNeill, Long Creek, received the following letter from his son, Gr. Wilmot MacNeill, of the Siege Battery:  
Roffey Camp, Jan. 6th, 1916.  
Dear Father,—I intended to write to you before, but somehow put it off. I suppose you got my card. I mailed it from Plymouth. I wrote it in the ranks and gave it to a kid to mail. We had a nice trip across. I was not sick at all, although it was enough to make anyone sick. We were down in the storage. Well I found John over here, or at least he found me. He came here the day before New Year's Day and went back that night. He was only out of the Hospital a few days. His head is alright now but there is quite a scar down the side of his head, where the hair won't grow. He was not far from Jack MacLean when he was shot. I got a furlough on New Year's Day and went to London, met John at the station and we went to the place where he stays, at a private house and they are the nicest people I ever met. We met Jack MacEwen at the station; he is just the same as ever. We had a military funeral here today, a corporal Wood in our Battery. He came down from Esquimaux. He died on Tuesday. There is quite a number of our fellows sick. You will notice by the address that

our name is changed to the 95th Siege Battery. We have been tested and examined about a dozen times, and there are only 152 in the Battery now, out of 280. The rest will be sent as field artillery. There is a canteen on the grounds here and you can buy all kinds of beverages for very nearly nothing. I will close for now.
