Wireless Chain Being Advanced

LONDON, Oct. 21.—F. J. Brown, chairman of the Post-Office, Telephone and Telegraph Society, lecturing in London, dwelt with the question of an Imperial wireless chain. He announced that a station at Cairo would be finished at the end of the year, forming the first link of the chain to the Far East and to South Africa. Two additional stations will be erected in England and Egypt, which will form the first link of the chain to India, Singapore and Hong-Kong. There will be a third station in England for communication with Canada.

It was also announced that the commission of experts planning the Imperial stations were expected to complete their work next month, after which the work of construction would be pressed with all possible speed, with the object of providing the Empire, as soon as possible, with a system of wireless communication which would be the best in the world.

CLASH OVER CHURCH UNION

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 10.—Frist signs that opposition to church union in the Anglican General Synod is likely to be determined and persistent were in evidence at Saturday morning's session when a clash occurred over the setting of the time of the Union debate. As a result the debate is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon or evening, the time it will secure being dependent on the extent of the discussion on the report of the general board of religious education. Under a special canon the latter has precedence.

Saturday's clash arose over a question from Rev. Dr. R. J. Renison, of Hamilton, as to the time at which the union debate was to commence.

Dean Lyd remarked that the union debate had been set for Monday, but Dr. Renison persisted that the whole question of when the debate should take place should be re-opened. E. J. Fream, of Calgary, rising on a point of order, declared that the Hamilton Synod had decided on Monday as to the date for the consideration of the bishop's pronouncement. His contention was upheld by the chair. Twice later, Dr. Robison attempted to voice his contention, but his efforts to make his point proving unavailable, he and others who supported him finally bowed to the inevitable.

Will Use Catapults to Launch Airplanes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The navy will shortly install on one of its modern battleships a complete catapult unit for the launching of airplanes. This is designed to give a plane the "flying speed" it requires before it takes the air.

"The catapult," says Secretary Denby in a statement, "consists of a carriage moving on tracks. On this carriage is mounted an airplane. By means of the motive plant use, the carriage is caused to move on the tracks at an increasing acceleration until near the end of the tracks, the speed is sufficient to permit the airplane to take the air. Then the carriage is brought to rest."

TOULOUSE, France, October 18.—King Albert of Belgium reached Toulouse yesterday in an airplane flight from Barcelona, Spain. He resumed his flight this evening, bound for Paris, whence he will go to Brussels.
