**ST. PAUL'S CHURCH**

Reverend Mr. Raymond in his message to the boys and girls on Sunday morning took as his subject the "Gates of Learning." He went on to show that the first lessons of life are learned through the dangers as seen through the eyes. There are however things which boys and girls should not notice, they should shut their eyes on such occasions. If boys and girls have Jesus Christ in their lives He will close their eyes to such things.

Mr. Raymond's sermon for the morning dealt with the prophet Haggal. After giving a short historical review of the circumstances leading up to the exile, the Rector showed the purpose Haggal had in view in writing his prophecy and the lesson which is to be derived from the prophecy.

The welcome speaker at the evening services was Reverend J. N. Blodgett of Toronto. "If it be so, our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace and he will deliver us out of the hand of O King, but if not, be it known unto thee O King that we will not serve thy gods nor will we worship the golden image which thou hast set up." (Daniel 3, 17-18) was the text of the speaker's sermon. He showed that his text was the reply made by Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, three young Hebrew men who refused to worship the idols set up by King Nebuchadnezzar, when commanded to do so by the king upon the penalty of being cast into the fiery furnace if they refused to do so.

Reverend Mr. Blodgett dealt with the subject under three headings: (a) The majesty of their belief, (b) indifference toward their own suffering, (c) Vindication of their faith.

In dealing with the first heading, the speaker showed that as the three young Hebrews loved God with all their hearts, souls and minds and had been taught by their parents and teachers that the worship of idols was wrong and there was but one God, they believed without a doubt that God would protect them.

In dealing with the second heading the speaker wondered whether we as men and women are willing to show our colors without the fear of criticism. This he attributed to be solution for the problems of the world today. The world is looking in all directions for a solution of the difficulties which it has to meet.
