### KING ALFONSO

Regret will be caused by the news that the King of Spain's health is causing anxiety again, especially as there is talk of a slight operation being contemplated, and the hope will be general that he may be restored to health. Mention of King Alfonso recalls just now the somewhat amusing episode of the state visit to the Kaiser which he did not pay. After a good deal of correspondence the Kaiser's intimates that his engagements would prevent his meeting the young Spanish monarch in Berlin, and that he would have to receive him instead at one of the watering-places which he had arranged to visit. Upon this King Alfonso informed the German Ambassador that if he went to Germany it must be to meet the Kaiser in his own capital, and not in any provincial town, and in the result his visit was postponed sine die.

**40,000 CANADIAN SOLDIERS** EXPECTED TO GO IN TRAINING AT VALCARTIER NEXT YEAR.

**QUEBEC, Nov. 11.**—The next year may eclipse all previous records at Valcartier Camp in the matter of the amount of troops in training there is the statement of Col. McBain, who says he would not be surprised to see as many as forty thousand more there for the season.

**Col. McBain** thinks that outside Valcartier there is not accommodation for more than 25,000 troops and as there are already some sixty thousand men in Canada under training and the call has now gone out for 100,000 more next summer should constitute a record for the local camp. In the meanwhile he hopes that the Provincial Government and the City of Quebec will realize the importance of building good roads to connect the city with the camp.

### Belgian Fete Day Appeal

The British National Committee for Relief in Belgium has sent the following appeal, signed by the Lord Mayor of London to all the High Commissioners and Agents-General of the Overseas Dominions. It has been transmitted to me by Sir George Perley and is as follows:

"The Fete Day of the heroic King of the Belgians falls on Monday, 15th November, and as Chairman of the National Committee for Relief of the Belgium I appeal to the people of the British Empire to celebrate the event in a manner that will afford King Albert the greatest satisfaction, namely by subscribing money enough to feed the whole of the 3,000,000 destitute Belgians in Belgium on their beloved Monarch's Fete Day. Six pence will keep one Belgian alive for one day, therefore, I appeal for 3,000,000 sixpences to enable us to keep alive on the King's fete day every one of his subjects who is without food. Canada has responded nobly to the cry of starving Belgians, and I feel certain that this special appeal for sixpence per day will meet with ready response."

The appeal is for a most worthy object and is commended to your best consideration and to such action as you may think desirable. The message having been transmitted to me as premier of Canada, I feel it my duty to comment it to you as premier of the Province.

### Canadians Were Bigger Attraction Than Hun Cannon

**LONDON, November 11.**—Even the captured German guns, which were a feature of the Lord Mayor's procession today, were not cheered so loudly as were the overseas troops, headed by the Canadians. The enthusiasm of the crowds was not damped by the pouring rain. While the overseas troops waited in the Strand during the swearing in ceremony, waitresses

from the adjacent restaurants brought them sandwiches and ladies bought them cigarettes.

**LONDON, Nov. 11.**—Sir George Perley states that he has been keeping in touch with the Admiralty authorities to prevent the possibility of a large quantity of freight being left

in Montreal when navigation closes. He adds that the Admiralty, besides placing three interned German steamers at the disposal of the Dominion Government for the transportation of wheat, are devising other facilities for adequate transport throughout the winter for the increased output of Canadian supplies.
