SUPREME COURT—In the Supreme Court yesterday His Lordship the Chief Justice delivered judgment in the appeal case of Ethel Stewart vs. J. Leslie Poole; executors and others. This case arose out of the will of Jessie I. Poole of Lower Montague. His Lordship dismissed the appeal with costs. Mr. Justice Arsenault concurred with the judgment in full. Mr. Justice Hazard dissented with regard to costs, but concurred with the rest of the judgment. Mr. Johnston, K. C. and appellant, Messrs. Stewart, K. C. and McPhee for the respondents. In the case of Macdonald vs. Stetson application for a new trial was refused with costs by Mr. Justice Hazard, who delivered judgment. Mr. Bentley, K. C. and D. MacKinnon, K. C. for appellant, and Gaudin, K. C. for respondent. The application of Mr. G. W. Gardiner for re-opening of his appeal case was refused.

WEEVIL DESTROYED IN STORED BEANS

TORONTO, Nov. 16.—Bean weevils may cause serious losses to beans stored for seed or feed. The activities of this insect, which begin in the field, continue when the beans are placed in storage, and when conditions are favorable the pests reproduce and feed during the entire storage season.

Gas Kills Insects

A convenient method of control, suggested by Harry L. Gul, assistant entomologist at the Ohio Experimental Station, is to fumigate the beans with carbon bisulphide. Fill a tight bin box or other container with beans to within a few inches of the top. On top of the beans place a shallow dish or pan large enough to hold the required amount of the fumigant, which is 1 ounce for each 100 pounds of beans. Cover the container with a tight lid immediately. Carbon bisulphide vaporizes very rapidly, and the fumes which are heavier than air...

Hydrated Lime Used

Seed beans may be protected by storing the air-slaked or hydrated lime. Enough of the lime should be used so that when it is shaken down it will be thoroughly mixed with and cover the beans. Beans treated in this manner should be kept in a dry place. Beans that have been injured by the weevil should not be used for seed.

Quality Unaffected

The germinating quality of the seed is not reduced by this practice. The container should not be opened for at least 24 hours. The temperature in the container should be above 65 degrees F. since at a lower temperature the gas is not as effective and more carbon bisulphide may be required. It must be remembered that carbon bisulphide is an explosive which ignites readily on exposure to flame or extreme heat.

Nestor Among Clergy Became World Citizen

William H. Heartz, D. D., of Amherst, Nova Scotia, who has just died in his 87th year, was first Chairman of the Board of Foreign Missions of the United Church of Canada. He is noteworthy as a churchman and as a Canadian.

A MARITIME LEADER

"Dr. Heartz was a true son of the Maritimes. He was born in Prince Edward Island of a family devoted to public service. He entered the ministry in the old Methodist Conference of Eastern British America in 1862. He served his probation for four years in New Brunswick and was ordained in 1866. He was elected President of the Nova Scotia Conference five times and represented his Conference faithfully at Quadrennial General Conferences and on general boards almost to his death.

A ZEALOUS CANADIAN

"Dr. Heartz was a good Canadian churchman. For forty years in the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, he never failed to lift up his voice for extension of home missions to the farthest bounds and newest settlements of the nation. Jealous of Canada's good name abroad, he was interested in Christian education at home, in the training and dispatch of foreign missionaries, in the Christianization of every nook of the Dominion's life.

BENEFACTOR OF MISSIONS

"Dr. Heartz was a good citizen of the world. Through two generations, his support of Christian effort abroad never wavered. Giving his personal attention to the duties of Conference evangelist in Nova Scotia, he let his vision range afar and sent out his gifts in thousands of dollars to evangelize West China, to found scholarships for Chinese students at West China Christian University, to develop training centres for African youth under the aegis of the Church that he loved.

REVERED AND MOURNED

The interests that were his in the eastern provinces throughout his public career of 65 years—evangelism, education and missions—were the interests which he fostered in the councils of his Church so persuasively as to make him an outstanding figure over the period of almost unexampled duration. He was revered as a leader and he mourned as a friend of all brave causes and high endeavours."
