## STOCK MARKETS ARE A GAIN ON THE RAMPAGE

### THE BODY OF A GREAT MAN LAID TO REST

Impressive Funeral Yesterday Of Late Finance Minister, Hon. James A. Robb—Members Of Diplomatic Corps, Cabinet Colleagues, Members Of Parliament And Other Prominent Men Among Silent Gathering.

(Canadian Press) VALLEYFIELD, Que., Nov. 13.—With many hundreds of people surrounding the grave, the body of Hon. James A. Robb, Finance Minister, was laid away in the family plot in the little cemetery in the centre of this city today. In the silent gathering were a representative of the Governor General, the Diplomatic Corps from Ottawa, Cabinet colleagues, members of Parliament, prominent business men and fellow citizens. A slight rain was falling and half-masted flags hung limply on their poles. The city was in mourning for its leading citizen, who was stricken in Toronto on Monday. The interment took place after services at the Robb home and United Church. The funeral service at the home of Mr. Robb was conducted by Rev. John G. Greig, the Finance Minister's pastor. There were present Mrs. Robb, Misses K. and G. Robb, sisters; Thomas and Mrs. Hood, the latter another sister of the deceased and J. A. MacDonald and William MacDonald, cousins and partners. ### Downward Flight Of Prices On The New York Exchange

Officials Taking Action To Learn Source Of The Destructive Pressure—Nation's Financial Stability Threatened.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Ruthless and unremitting crushing down of quoted values went forward with augmented force on the Stock Market today, as officials of the Stock Exchange took action to learn the source of the destructive pressure, and unofficial reassurances as to the Nation's financial stability and strength were forthcoming from important sources in Washington. Again the decline was orderly as it was persistent, but more than 400 stocks explored levels previously untouched this year and the volume of trading for the three hour session swelled to 7,761,430 shares, a total unsurpassed in any session of this duration, even exceeding the turnover of 7,134,000 shares of October 7. Losses ran from two to a maximum of 29 points, but few leading issues dropped more than 10 points. Call money again was in abundant supply at six per cent, and 30 day time money was reduced to 5 1/2 per cent from 6. Among shares reaching new lows were such premier shares as General Electric, which dropped 16 1/2 to 16 1/4 and closed at 171-3/4. U. S. Steel, which dropped 3 1/3 points to 150, and closed at 151 1/2, having sold at high 160 during a brief rally in the morning. American Can. off 10, to 100.

### ASK RESULTS OF VISIT TO CANADA

Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal and Minister of Unemployment, Subjected to Sharp Questioning in House.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Persistent questioning of Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal and Minister of Unemployment, occupied the House of Commons for an unusually long period at question time today. The opposition directed sharp queries in the actual results of his visit to Canada and of his methods in reducing unemployment. Mr. Thomas adopted a very deliberate manner in his replies. At times he was ponderous or discourteous to a degree which brought laughter and ironical cheers from the Opposition benches. The questioners were not wholly on the Opposition side, for Mr. Thomas was interrogated by Rt.

### Phillips Resigns As Minister To The Dominion

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—William Phillips has resigned as minister to Canada. Mr. Phillips who is one of the leading United States diplomats, plans to quit the Diplomatic Service probably late next month and settle with his family in New England. President Hoover accepted the resignation with great reluctance and sought to induce Mr. Phillips to remain in the public service. However the Minister explained that he desired to leave office after many years of service in order to rear his family in the United States.

### Over Forty Mar. Fox Breeders Will Attend Winter Fair

(Special to the Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 13.—A representative party of fox breeders from the Maritimes, probably forty or more will leave by the Canadian National Railway on Monday next for the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto. They will be accompanied by live foxes for exhibits from Prince Edward Island and Mainland points. From a small beginning on Prince Edward Island, the fox farming industry has branched out until it is world wide in its scope. The Maritimes however still maintain their supremacy in this industry, both for quality and numbers, the largest fox ranch in the world being located in New Brunswick.

### U. S. Apple Crop Below Average

(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—The apple crop in the United States this year is short and the "apple a day" slogan may be suspended temporarily. Compared with that of last year, it is off 23 per cent and 48,000,000 bushels below the average. Scab damage in the east and worm damage in the west have resulted in an inferior quality. Prices have already advanced and promises to be 25 per cent above a year ago.

### Plot Discovered For Wholesale Sing Sing Break

(Canadian Press) COSSING, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Sing Sing prison officials today revealed that a plot for wholesale escape of the prison's 2,000 inmates had been discovered and the ring leaders put in solitary confinement. With the recent outbreaks at Auburn, Dannemora and Canon City, Colo., still plotters were kept fresh in their minds, Sing Sing officials had kept a close watch on known unruly prisoners. A week ago they got word of a plot which included the smuggling of weapons into the old cell block short circuiting the lighting system and the use of a false key to open cells in which the emora and Canon City, Colo., still plotters were kept.

### Monthly Meeting Of City Council

Authorization Of \$15,000 Debentures—Discussion On Milk Situation.

Considerable discussion took place at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last night. Mayor Yeo presided and all the Councillors with two exceptions were present. After the reading of the minutes and passing of a number of bills a communication was read with regard to a building on Cumberland street, which was alleged to be a fire-trap and a menace to public welfare. The building inspector was called upon to investigate the matter. His Worship brought up the matter of broken street lights. Quite a number of these lights are below par he stated and suggested that the matter be taken up with the proper authorities by the committee. Councillor Holman stated that a number of complaints had been received from merchants to the effect that lights in their stores have become inadequate. Councillor McLeod said that lights in private houses are also below the former standard. Dr. I. E. Croken reported for the month three portions of carcasses had been condemned as unfit for food and destroyed. As a result of the milk test 13 samples were found to contain sediment.

### More Maritime Men Indicted In Bangor, Me., Court

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 13.—Additional indictments of aliens, mostly from the Maritime Provinces, arrested on the border for violating migration laws, reported today, brought the number up to about 75 in all mostly from Nova Scotia and the province of Quebec.

### Offered Services

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 13.—The Premiers of Ontario and Quebec have offered their "good offices" to the pulp and paper companies in case they are needed to renew the agreement reached last year on the production of newsprint, which agreement expires at the end of this year. Premier L. A. Taschereau said in a statement issued today.
