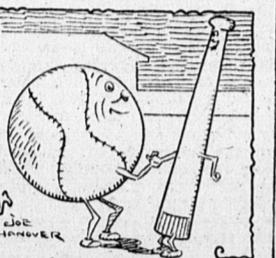

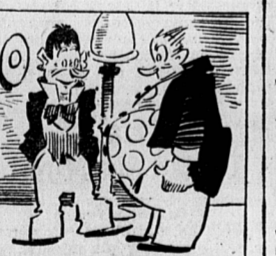

Duncan Report Is Upheld In Debate

The first move for Confederation, he pointed out, was not made by the provinces, but by the Premier of Lower Canada and Upper Canada at a time of political deadlock. The products of the Eastern Provinces were promised ready markets in Upper and Lower Canada over a railroad which would be built for them.

TRANSCONTINENTAL PROMISED

Hon. George Brown, Premier of Upper Canada, said Mr. Guthrie, even went farther and promised that he would give the provinces a railway through to the Pacific if Confederation. But New Brunswick turned it down and Sir Charles Tupper "dare not present it to his Legislature" of Nova Scotia. Afterward, however, the agreement was made for the union.

The Conservative leader pointed out that the British North America Act did not create the confederation of the provinces, but gave authority for the carrying out of the agreement entered into between the Maritimes and the Canadas. The Dominion today was morally bound to carry out the terms of the agreement.

Mr. Guthrie then dealt with the acquiring of lands by the Dominion Government from the Hudson's Bay Company for which the Maritime Provinces paid a share. The provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba were formed from this territory. Ontario received an additional 100,000,000 acres and Quebec 120,000,000 acres but not an acre was given to the Maritimes although they had entered Confederation on an equal financial basis.

When the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta were created, the Dominion paid a subsidy the same as to the other provinces, but instead of handing over the lands, the Dominion gave Alberta and Saskatchewan heavy cash subsidies annually and these new provinces received great benefits for which the Maritimes paid in part. On that point alone, the Maritimes could raise a strong claim for readjustment.

Freight rates claims. With regard to freight rates, Mr. Guthrie claimed that the Maritimes were in the right, as their demands were based on resolutions adopted in 1864. The Dominion Government had built a railway but it had been planned for military and strategic purposes on the assumption that the United States might one day invade Canada. the result that the Maritimes could not properly transport freight over the road. Preferential treatment had been granted them, however, but it was cancelled in 1912 and today the eastern provinces were paying the same rates as the rest of Canada.
