

NO POTATOES CAN COME

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—An order-in-council has been passed amending these sections of the destructive insect and pest act which deals with the potato canker by the substitution of a clause prohibiting the importation of all potatoes from Europe in addition to Newfoundland and other points mentioned. Potato canker is a virulent fungus disease which has done tremendous destruction in Europe during some years past. Until last year importations of potatoes from Great Britain and Ireland and other European points had not been heavier either in this country or the United States, but the failure of the crop last year and the high prices led to heavy importation. As the potato canker is a disease which not only absolutely destroys the tubers but is very hard to eradicate, and will remain in the soil for seven or eight years, the most strenuous precautions are justified. In Great Britain a great deal of very costly work is being undertaken in regard to this pest. The United States have recently taken action by passing an act prohibiting the importation of potatoes from Great Britain and Ireland and several countries in continental Europe and Australia.

TO BUILD NEW SHIPS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—The contract for what will be the finest vessel in the government service, has just been let to the firm of J. Thornycroft and company, limited, of Southampton, England.

This is the new armed steamer for the customs patrol service in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The price of the contract has not been announced, but it is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$55,000, the Southampton firm being the lowest tenderers.

THE NAVAL POLICY.


OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—The prime minister has received a thick volume which has been forwarded by Sir William White, of Winnipeg. This contains the western signatures to the non-party resolutions regarding the navy which have been passed in Winnipeg and Toronto and other places. The text of the resolutions has been made public already. The Winnipeg signatures number hundreds and indeed thousands. The list is headed by the lieutenant-governor, the prime minister, Sir William White and the editors of the three daily newspapers, and contains the names of practically all the business and professional men of the city, of both parties, and smaller lists of signatures from Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, Medicine Hat and Calgary are included.

PRETENDED HE WAS DEAD.

MONTREAL, Sept. 18.—After receiving several wires, asking for money, from his sixteen-year-old son Albert, who had run away and who had been stranded in Sudbury, Ont., J. B. Souchereau, of Verdun, got a message purporting to be signed by the station agent at Sudbury, mentioning that Albert Souchereau was dead at that place. The father made all preparations for the reception of his son's remains at his home, having the house draped and tier installed, with candles ready. He also ordered a large quantity of flowers, and several friends sent in wreaths. Mr. Souchereau himself went to Sudbury to get the body, wiring ahead to the undertaker there to have a casket ready. Much to his surprise, he was met at the depot by the boy, who had practised this deception in order to get home after he had spent all the money sent him.

TRY TO SAVE MURDERER.

BARRINGTON, N. H., Sept. 18.—Mrs. F. L. Howe, of Barrington, said today that her husband who left Calais, Maine, last night for St. John, and who is today in St. John, will hurry to Boston to see Governor Foss and tell certain secrets he knows concerning Chester Jordan, the condemned murderer, which he thinks will save him from the electric chair next week. Mrs. Howe sells antique furniture and silver, and is well known to the trade at St. John. Jordan, who brutally killed his wife at Somerville, Mass., in 1906, visited the Howe home at Barrington, N. H. a few days before the crime. At that time he was particularly devoted to his young bride, Mrs. Howe said to a St. John Globe correspondent: "The murderer was here just before the murder he acted strangely. He visited a mica mine on our place and hurled a great rock into it, although there were men working below. We all believed him crazy."
