**PASSED AWAY**—The death occurred at his home in Kingston Friday evening of Mr. Daniel T. Fraser aged 73, a well known and highly respected farmer. Mr. Fraser was in the city on Thursday and yesterday was working as usual but after supper became quite ill and suddenly passed away. Mr. Fraser was a deacon in the Baptist Church and a school trustee for many years. He leaves a widow and one son John A. Fraser of the Customs and four daughters.

**CATTLE MAN HERE**—After visiting almost all the Guernsey herds on the Island, Mr. H. C. Roper, Guernsey Field Man for the Maritime Provinces, reports a considerable improvement in type and in milk production. He has noticed additions to many herds and a tendency to refuse to part with any stock. Mr. Roper holds from Princeport, N. S., and is accompanied by Mr. Howard R. Ryan of Truro. **HOTEL TO BE MOVED**—The C. N. R. Hotel building on the corner of Water and Eustace Streets, Summerside, has been bought by the proprietor, Mr. Ahearn, formerly of Borden, and is being moved on to the large vacant lot at the back of Taylor and MacNeill's garage and when placed in position will face on Hanover Street. This is one of the largest buildings to be moved in one unit for many years at Summerside. The site from which the hotel is being moved has been acquired by the McColl Frontenac Oil Co., who are putting in a series of large tanks for an up to date filling station and garage. S.

**ISLANDER GETS CALL TO COLLEGE TOWN**—Rev. George Morris, B. D., who for the past three years has been pastor of the United Church of Canada at Debes, N. B., has accepted a call to the historic church at Stanstead, Quebec. Mr. Morris is a native of Granville in this Province, and has held parishes at Kensington, Tryon and Summerside. He has this week been attending Conference at Sackville, and is taking advantage of the occasion to pay a flying visit to his old home in Granville. His transfer to the Montreal and Ottawa Conference took place on the opening day of the Maritime Conference in Sackville. Stanstead, to which place he and his family intend moving the first of July, is the home of Wesleyan College, and is situated in the Eastern township in what is sometimes called the Switzerland of Canada.

The following telegram, in reply to the request for information with respect to the appropriation of \$200,000 for a C. N. R. hotel at Charlottetown, was received on Saturday by Mr. S. A. MacDonald, president of the Association Boards of Trade: "Railway estimates are usually voted in totals in Commons after details are examined and discussed by select committee. Amount for hotel at Charlottetown is included in the total vote. (Sgd.) R. H. Jenkins."

Mr. MacDonald, on receipt of the telegram, wired back: "Thornton views Guardian in view of heavy hotel commitments already in hand not practicable to undertake further expenditures on this account during 1929 but intention to proceed next year if Parliament approves. Confer with other Island representatives."

The following reply was received: "Replying your wire, initial vote has been approved by Parliament but reasonable time must be given to carry out details. Have conferred with other members. (Sgd.) R. H. Jenkins."

The many friends of Mr. Nelson Rattenbury and family of this city will sympathize with them in the double bereavement which has fallen upon them. On February 22nd, Mr. Rattenbury's brother, William Henry Rattenbury passed away at El Paso, Texas, and on May 27th, his nephew William H. Rattenbury, jr., died in a Moosejaw, Sask. hospital.

The late Mr. William H. Rattenbury Sr., left the Island some fifty years ago, when quite a young man and settled in El Paso where he had since resided. He was a leading contractor in that city and some of the finest public buildings and many private residences were erected by him.

He amassed considerable wealth and had large interests in Mexico, but owing to troubled conditions in that country he lost there approximately a quarter of a million dollars about ten years ago. He is survived by two sons John Edward and William H. He was a native of the New London district and was one of seven brothers, all of whom have passed away except Mr. Nelson Rattenbury of this city.

He is survived by two brothers Roland B. and Morton, both of Winnipeg, and two sisters, Mrs. L. Moonsey, Tampa, Fla., and Miss Milfred F. of Winnipeg.

One brother Reginald was killed at Vimy during the Great War.

The death of Mr. Peter McCourt, which occurred in this city on Saturday evening, severs another link with the past and removes from Charlottetown and the Province a highly esteemed citizen.

Rev. Monsignor Maurice MacDonald, Parish Priest of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, Rev. A. J. McIntyre and Arthur McQuaid, are in a critical state at the Charlottetown Hospital and Louis Dougan is suffering grievous injuries from an accident yesterday morning about 11:15 in which a car owned and driven by Mr. W. J. Brown of this city was struck by the Souris train as she was steaming into Charlottetown near the Experimental Farm. The car was proceeding along a by-road connecting the Experimental Farm with the Malpeque road. Where the road meets the railroad track there is a slight ascent of five or six feet.

Mr. Frank Vessey, of the Nash Sales Motors of this city who was driving along the road behind Mr. Brown's car, and Mr. S. H. Colwell of West River who was with him were eyewitnesses of the disaster. The car driven by Mr. Brown, says Mr. Vessey, was proceeding along the road at a fairly fast clip. For a few seconds she slowed down but then picked up speed again, climbed the ascent and stalled on the tracks. Monsignor MacDonald's condition was early considered very critical. He regained consciousness while being driven to the hospital. He suffered a compound fracture of the leg about the knee and a fracture of the upper arm and is badly injured about the ear.

Father MacIntyre whose condition is also considered critical by reason of advanced age regained consciousness about 3 p. m. His right hip was fractured two ribs were broken and he suffered a severe scalp wound

over the right eye. Mr. Dougan had his right leg broken and suffered severe injuries to his head. Mr. McQuaid may have incurred a fracture of the spine and his head was badly cut. The doctors consider his condition critical. It will not be known until this evening whether or not his spine has been fractured.
