ARE WE SEEKERS AFTER TRUTH?

One of our mistakes in dealing with alcoholism is putting enormous emphasis on the physical process upon chronic alcoholism. The idea that alcohol is going to give a long physical disease is not really what we want. Usually we want to prevent drunkenness. I think it would be possible to make drunkenness as anti-social behaviour as nakedness. There is no group of people so conventional as young people. The people can break conventions, young people can't. Developing conventions is one feature of preventive medicine.

Press Comments on Federal Election

(By The Canadian Press)

Quebec Le Soleil (Independent-Liberal): "With hearty congratulations to Louis St. Laurent and those who contributed to his enormous success," Le Soleil intimates to the so-called "Provincial autonomists" that they have to "submit to the manifest will of the country in favor of better co-operation with the only national government in Ottawa."

Sherbrooke, Que. La Tribune (Liberal): "... The triumph of Mr. St. Laurent reveals a living sentiment of national unity, appropriate to assure the prosperity of all the Provinces ..."

Montreal Gazette (Independent): "It is doubtful if any political leader in Canadian history has ever been elected to power with a clearer expression of public confidence than that which greeted Mr. St. Laurent when he was elected. He has been a 'truly Canadian choice.'"

Montreal Star (Independent): "Mr. St. Laurent will be a proud and happy man today, happy not only in the overwhelming tribute paid him by Quebec but happy in the fact that Canadians everywhere, regardless of race, language and religion, joined in the vote of confidence."

Windsor Star (Independent): "The Government has an overwhelming mandate. One hopes it will accept this tremendous vote of confidence with humility and a spirit of responsibility."

Hamilton Spectator (Independent): "The present overwhelming majority of the Liberal Party is not a good thing for the country; nor does it accurately reflect the feelings of the Canadian public. It will put a heavy onus on the Conservative Party to ask itself . . . whether in trying to align itself in name and platform with the pink Polyanthus and purple groups, it has not been guilty of willingness to barter its rugged heritage for a mess of 'votage.'"

Wellsford-Corborno Tribune (Independent): "Canada has enjoyed prosperous times under the past regime of the Liberal Party. They go back to Ottawa with an increased majority and therefore will be in a position to carry out the plans they have for future development of the country."

Kitchener-Waterloo Record (Independent): "Some Liberal supporters are not sure the best interests of the country are served by such a one-sided Government setup."

Staford Beacon-Herald (Independent): "The solid Quebec bloc is now buttressed by the Liberal-Ontario — something of a modern political history in this country. The outcome of the election is a big step in the return to the two-party system — something which is earnestly desired by hosts of people as the best hope for stable Government."
