A PICTOU Exchange says:—We congratulate our young friend, Harry Yorston, upon his fortunate escape from death while working on the Hillsborough, P. E. I. bridge. His father, Councillor Yorston, was greatly surprised to receive a telegram a few days ago saying that Harry was in a dangerous condition as the result of working in the caisson. He was supposed to be working in a less dangerous place and did not inform his parents of the change to the more dangerous part of the work. The caisson had been excavated 90 feet below the tide and had to be supplied with fresh air from pumps. The pressure at that depth is very heavy, and it takes a robust man to stand it. The work is so dangerous and difficult that men work only three hours per day. The great danger is upon coming to the surface. Upon breathing the fresh air the men frequently go into convulsions, and death is not a stranger. Only about four days previous a man had died upon reaching the surface. And one can readily see that only men of courage and spirit undertake the dangerous work. A medical doctor is always at hand and restoratives are ready. Mr. Yorston was in convulsions for several hours before he could be removed to the hospital, and his case was almost fatal. His father brought him home last Tuesday and he is out of danger, although he has suffered a great deal from the severe methods necessarily used to save his life.

ONE of Charlottetown's well known Assyrians, Simon Joseph by name, who has resided in the city for a number of years was somewhat surprised Tuesday by the appearance at his residence here of a wife that he had left in the far distant land of his nativity, when years ago he sailed to seek his fortune in the New World. Since coming to our fair land his love for her, whom he had left in far distant Assyria grew colder and colder till he began to look for another to share with him the comforts of home and prosperity. Another fair lady was soon picked out, the nuptial knot was tied by a clergyman of the city, and Simon and wife No. 2 lived in happy conjugal bliss till the present time. Simon however had a son who with him had emigrated to America and this lad after quarrelling with his father some time ago wrote to wife No 1 in Assyria informing her of the faithlessness of her unworthy spouse. Impelled by a desire to once more see Simon, after accumulating enough money to pay her passage, Mrs. Joseph the First, set sail from Europe for Boston and after reaching Montreal she boarded the Bonavista for Charlottetown and with her three other children arrived here two days ago. With her advent the clouds darkened the happy life of the Assyrian and his unlawful wife; he sought the unwelcome visitor to induce her to depart but she was persistent in her demand for support. The matter was reported to the police and now Simon is faced by the shadow of a bigamy trial.
