A MAYOR'S TROUBLES.

Ottawa has had a fierce quarrel going on for some time between its Mayor, Mr. Morris and its Chief of Police, Mr. Powell. The Chief was a while ago put on his defence for sundry alleged irregularities including neglect of duty and intemperance. The police force appear to be loyal to their Chief. Mayor Morris apparently intended to be a candidate for another term at the civic election to come off in January next. It is stated that the Chief and his men were determined to prevent the re-election of the Mayor. So the other day as told in our despatches at the time, the Mayor was caught in the act of taking a drink at the Russell House after the legal hours. This offence in a civic official under the Ontario law involved immediate loss of office and disqualification for two years to come. The Mayor admitted the offence and was fined \$5 and \$3 costs.

The City Council appears to have chosen a new Mayor to fill out the unexpired term, and Mr. Morris is reported to be endeavoring to secure from the Governor of Ontario a pardon, which it is claimed the Governor has the power to grant as the offence committed was made such by a provincial statute. It is also claimed that a free pardon would remove the disqualification which is much the severest part of the penalty under which ex Mayor Morris suffers. In the meantime the Ottawa papers and many others have been discussing the moral and political aspects of the case, although there seems not to have been much politics in the matter. It is charged that the law was not put in force against the Mayor for morality's sake, but from personal animosity.

It is common enough to allege personal motives in such cases, but at this distance we fail to see why the Ottawa police should not prosecute the Mayor when they found him violating the law. It has often been charged that policemen are very ready "run in" some poor sot, or some unimportant person while the equally guilty but rich or powerful offenders are permitted to escape. It is clearly a worse offence for the Mayor of a city to violate the law than for an ordinary citizen to do so, and it no doubt required more courage on the part of the police to select a shining mark for the arrows of prosecution. The fact that there may have been personal animosity in the case affords no sort of excuse for the Mayor in his undisputed violation of the law.

There is one other feature of the case which is worthy of mention. The Ontario law, very justly as we think, not only provides a penalty for those who sell liquor after hours, but also for those who buy after hours. The wrong is not altogether on one side. There would be no illegal sale if there were no illegal purchasers. The feature of making the illegal buyer a sharer in the responsibility and also in the penalty for the transaction is one which we would like to see extended beyond the bounds of Ontario. But of course there are obvious difficulties in the way as it has been usually on the testimony of the purchaser that the illegal vendor is convicted.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., and Hon. By regulation of the Department at Ottawa the digging of mussel mud is prohibited within 200 yards of any live oyster bed, or otherwise except at places authorized by a fishery officer. Trout River, Prince Co., is closed to mud digging excepting above a line drawn from Peter Miller's, Middle Point, to a point of land at the end of Yeo's Portash road, and Bideford River, Prince County, excepting above a line drawn from Bideford Shipyard to Colin McKay's point, including Paves Creek.

CHOLERA BROKEN OUT.

Cholera has broken out at Sourabaya, E. I., and is spreading. From 100 to 120 cases are reported daily.

NOT ALLOWED TO LAND.

The Newfoundland dog 'Bouncer', which, with a beautiful little cart and harness, was given to the Duke and Duchess at St. John's Newfoundland, as a present for their Royal Highnesses' children has been prohibited from landing at Portsmouth, under the regulations of the Board of Agriculture, affecting the importation of dogs.

DOING AWAY WITH WORLDFLINESS.

The trustees of the Williamsport, Pa., East End Baptist church, Rev. L. P. Frey, pastor, decided to prohibit the holding of fairs, festivals, and suppers for the purpose of raising money for the support of the church. They believe that the raising of money in this way is a hindrance to spirituality and a violation of giving to God's cause. They also say the selling of tickets for such purposes has become a nuisance.

CURFEW ENFORCED.

In more than a thousand cities, and towns of the United States, according to Mrs. Morrow, of West Virginia, who addressed the National Women's Christian Temperance Union meeting Saturday at Fort Worth, Texas, curfew laws are in force. By the same authority the number of children arrested each year in America is 200,000.

FOR TREATMENT CONSUMPTIVES.

A committee appointed by the legislature of Rhode Island to consider the advisability of establishing a state sanatorium for the treatment of consumptives by the open-air method, has made a report in its favor. Last year 650 persons died of Consumption in the state, and in the past ten years there has been an average of 770 deaths annually from the disease.

FIVE DAY IMPRISONMENT

The court-martial appointed to enquire into the duel between Lieutenant Blackowitz and Lieutenant Hilderbrand, both army officers, at Insterburg, East Prussia, in which the former was killed, has sentenced Lieutenant Hilderbrand to two years imprisonment. Lieut. Grodeck, second to Lieutenant Hilderbrand, has been sentenced to five days imprisonment.
