THE EXERCISE OF EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY.

The Guardian in its issue a few days ago passed severe censure upon His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in connection with the release of Ernest White from jail after conviction for violation of the Prohibitory Law. It has since been brought to our knowledge that the sentence against White had been suspended by an Order in Council of the Provincial Executive, who must bear the responsibility for that action.

Our apologies are therefore due to Governor McKinnon for any censure passed upon him so far as that case is concerned, and we wish to give expression thereto in the same public manner as the censure was first expressed. We wish also to express our sense of His Honor's kindness of heart and many excellent qualities as a public official holding the highest station in the Province, and as a private citizen, in regard to which there is but one opinion.

We regret that the facts will not permit us to recede from the position before taken with regard to His Honor's exercise of the pardoning power in the past, and in support of the protests from time to time recorded, we append a list of the violators of the Prohibition Act who have been released within the short period of two months. The Guardian's sole desire in directing attention to this matter is to prevent the continuance

of a practice which if continued must go far to render a good law inoperative. Here is the two months list: Prisoners released on order of Lieutenant Governor McKinnon: Frank McAree, arrested and lodged in jail July 1, 1909 for three months commitment. Released Sept. 22, 1909, eight days before expiration of sentence, in good health. Louis Essory, lodged in jail July 30, 1909, for 1st offence, three months commitment. Released Sept 8 in good health.

John McKinnon, lodged in jail Aug. 2, 1909. First offence. Three months. Released Sept 18, 1909. Mary Jane McMillan, lodged in jail for six months, July 19, 1909. Removed to hospital on order of Lieut. Governor Sept 28, 1909. Remained there one day.

"This is Canada's growing time." Should the Legislature enact the necessary legislation the Dominion Government would be bound to make the appointments and pay the salaries. Why should not this Province have all the judicial institutions and paraphernalia of the bigger Provinces? There are great possibilities behind this proposition.

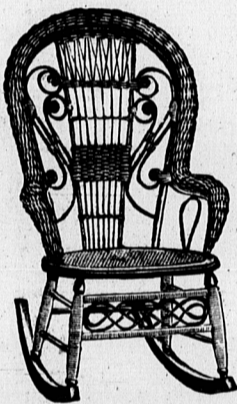
