Thomas Bram, was found guilty of the Herbert Fuller murder, and is serving a life sentence in the State Prison at Charlottetown, is still hopeful, alone with his counsel, that he may yet be free man, or at least given a new trial, which he thinks will result in his acquittal. This week there is to be a conference between him and his attorneys, Côtter and French. There have been gatherings of the three men, but the one that is to be this week will perhaps be the last before the lawyers take steps toward another trial of their client's case. The chances for a new trial are founded on the fact that Bram's jury, while finding him guilty of murder in the first degree, yet recommended that he be not executed, but imprisoned for life. THE Grand Division met in Quarterly Session at North Wiltshire, at 11 a. m. yesterday, G. W. P., Geo. W. Simpson, presiding. The afternoon session was a large one, the hall being well filled. After considerable discussion on the temperance question the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—Resolved that this Grand Division re-affirms its position in favor of National Prohibition of the liquor traffic. Pending the enactment of this we urge upon the Provincial Legislature to immediately pass a Prohibitory Law for this Province to the fullest extent of their power. A large public meeting was held in the evening addressed by Grand Division representatives and others. A number of the city delegates returned by the express which reached the city by midnight.

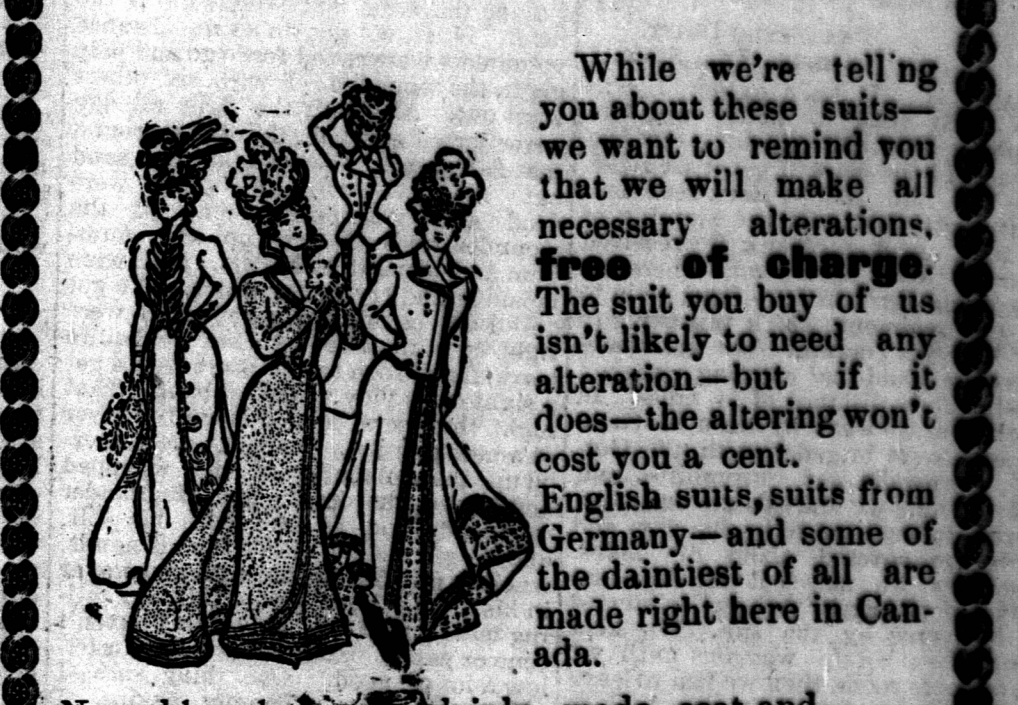
