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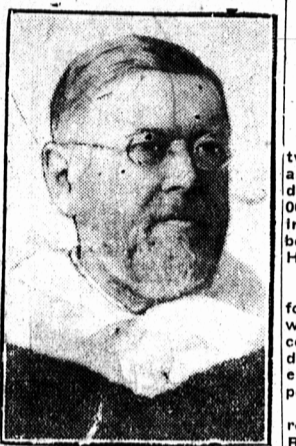
INVITES BOARD TO MEET IN VAN COUVER

STORM DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT \$30 MILLION

PRINCIPLES FOR WHICH THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY STANDS

NEED OF THE BRITISH FLEET FOR DEFENSE

Gunther Says Dominions Lined to Mother Country by Something More Than Mere Sentiment.

(Special to The Guardian) CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—John Gunther, in a copyright cable from London to the Chicago News today, commenting on the Locarno treaty says: "No one supposes that the dominions would be willing to send men to fight in a purely European squabble, no one wants them to. On the other hand any war big enough to bring in England will bring in the Dominions too. At least that is the view taken by everyone of any responsibility here, and the dominions are linked to the mother country in the event of a grave crisis by something other than mere sentiment, by the need of the British fleet for imperial defense."

Canada Wants a Direct Route To World Markets
