Conference adjourned at 12 o'clock to meet at 9:30 Monday morning. The ministerial session of the N. B. and Prince Edward Island conference was held Saturday afternoon. The attendance being fairly large. On motion Tompkinson, McDonald, having expressed a desire to take a circuit, it was placed in the hands of the superintendent of missions. The constant matter came up for a long discussion in which many took part. Dr. Carman occupying the chair. There were motions and substitute motions, points of law and of discipline. The matter was at last settled satisfactorily, however, Mr. Deinstadt making no claim for salary for the past year, during which time, through a number of untoward circumstances, he was unemployed on the circuit. I.) and Charles Frederick Gibson, were ordained with impressive ceremonies. Those who took part in laying on of hands, were Dr. Carman, Dr. Sprague, Dr. Stewart and Rev. George F. Dawson, A. D. McCully, W. C. Watson, T. Stebbings and M. R. Knight. This afternoon a Sunday school service was held, children occupying the body of the church. Excellent addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Kirby, Albert, and Colonel Moore, of Charlottetown.

NEWSPAPER CIRCULATION AT SEA.

It seems extraordinary to read of the circulation of a daily paper published on a shipboard reaching 2,500, but such has been the circulation of the Canada Daily Bulletin, published on the Lusitania, though the average daily circulation is nearer 2,000. It is a twenty-three page journal, printed on expensive glazed paper, and costing five cents a copy. It goes to press at 1 a.m., and can be delivered to passengers, if they so desire, in their berths early next morning. The editor gets his material apparently chiefly from the wireless service, and he has a place reserved for every item from election returns to stock exchange quotations.

NEW ORDER OF THE BATH.

The London County Council is making arrangements for enforcing some rather extraordinary powers which it secured about three years ago in a general powers bill. The medical officer, or any person authorized by him, may enter any room lodging houses to "examine the persons and clothing of inmates," and, when of opinion that the person or the clothing is in a foul condition, may give such inmates notice to submit himself and clothing within twenty-four hours to be washed. A systematic search for dirty people is now to be begun.

METHODIST CONFERENCE ABOUT OVER.

Owing to the scarcity of men a number of preaching appointments could not be filled. A special committee, consisting of Rev. R. W. Weddall and E. H. Beers, reported as follows: Your committee appointed to recommend to conference the best method of securing \$20,000, the amount apportioned to this conference as its share of the amount required to increase the capital account of the supernumerary fund, recommend that this conference appoint Rev. George Steel to act on its behalf in raising said amount. The report was adopted.

Rev. H. E. Thomas presented notice of motion which was given last year which proposed the gradual extinction of the children's fund between this date and the year 1912. On motion, the matter was laid on the table until next year.
