—EGG CIRCLE MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Edmond Bay egg circle was held in St. Philip's hall, Tuesday evening, February 13th; Mr. Edilbert Poirier occupied the chair and Mr. John F. Arsenault, the secretary, recorded the proceedings. The attendance was fairly large and a good deal of work was done. Mr. Albert Yeo and Ferdinand Richard were both present and gave their report of the general meeting held at Charlottetown sometime ago. Mr. Yeo was very explicit in his remarks and had collected a good deal of information which he cheerfully imparted to his hearers. He was highly pleased with his visit, and in his opinion saw a meeting addressed by so many able speakers would no doubt be instrumental in creating an interest in the poultry industry among the farmers.
