EDITORIAL NOTES

Emperor William and his party will this autumn visit all the historic points in Palestine under escort of Turkish ships of war to the coast and Turkish troops inland.

The eagerness with which our American exchanges are discussing what shall be done with the Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico is suggestive of the oft quoted receipt for making hare soup, which begins with, "First catch your hare."

And now there has been a rich discovery of gold in eastern Manchuria recently occupied by Russia. Thousands are already working in the mines which are almost as rich as those of Klondyke and in a much more genial climate.

Toronto Star says the gold output for the Klondyke is estimated at \$20,000,000 this season. This is not the highest figure that has been named, but is equal to one and a half times the public revenue of the Dominion in the year 1868.

This business of transporting troops to Cuba, the Philippines and Porto Rico is proving immensely costly. The latest of these expeditions, and the least expensive—the invasion of Porto Rico—costs the U S government \$4,500,000 for the hire of transport ships alone.

If Admiral Camara with the Cadiz fleet should really go on to Manila, as was proposed he will, at the end of his journey, have traversed the following distances:-

The voyage would take about forty days, with the probability of finding Manila an American port on his arrival.

The conditions of neutrality with regard to warships of belligerent powers are that their stay in Port Said and in the roadstead of Suez shall not exceed twenty-four hours, except in case of distress and then they shall be bound to leave as soon as possible. Having stayed that time the Spanish fleet was ordered to move, by the authorities on the demand of the American consul. There is some doubt as to the right to taken coal in the canal. Sir Charles Dilke has given the opinion that they might take coal and says that during the Russo-Turkish war the Russian ships were allowed that privilege.

The Anglo-American idea seems to be exceedingly popular in England. A committee has been formed for its promotion which numbers among its members, forty members of Parliament, as many dukes and earls, four archbishops, nearly all the bishops, Cardinal Vaughan, leading men of all the Nonconformist, bodies, heads of nearly all the colleges and great public schools, the mayors of fifty cities, and the principal literary men, painters, journalists, barristers and judges in the United Kingdom. The league makes a close approach to the throne through the Duke of Fyfe and the Marquis of Lorne.

The reduction of interest from 3 to 2 1/2 per cent in the post office savings banks is postponed till October, and even then not to be made "unless the condition of the money market warrant the change." If the reduction be then made the depositors of \$1,000 and upward are to be given the option of converting their savings bank certificates into Dominion stock bearing 3 per cent draw at five years date. We fail to see the propriety of thus giving the larger and presumably wealthier depositors a half of one per cent over those who have made but small savings. Of course it makes some difference that the money is retained for five years, but this stock arrangement will tend to aggravate the discontent among the depositors of smaller sums.

In New Brunswick the opposition press is confidently predicting an almost immediate provincial election. On the other hand the Surveyor General, Hon Mr Dunn, informs the Globe that he does not expect an election this year.

A valued subscriber would like to see in THE GUARDIAN the experience of some correspondent who has successfully raised fodder corn and finds it profitable. Our informant thinks some who formerly cultivated corn for feeding have gone out of the business, and wishes to know the reason.

Reply To Taxpayer.

SIR,—I notice that "Taxpayer" in the MORNING GUARDIAN of the 24th inst, attempts to come to the rescue of the government. He commences by stating "that teacher complains bitterly of the proposed repeal of the supplementary clause in the Education Act in doing away with the supplement to teachers."

Now "Taxpayer" shows his ignorance of the state of affairs when he does not recognize the difference between "proposed repeal" and an Act abolishing supplements. Then he states "that the supplement has largely gone into disuse, particularly in country districts." Now what sense is it for Taxpayer to talk nonsense of this kind, because by reference to the School Report of last year we see that about 300 teachers in the country as well as 43 teachers in Charlottetown and Summerside received supplements last year, clearly showing that the supplement has not largely gone into disuse.

Next, he says "that the bonus, if properly regulated, should be a sufficient safe-guard to the professional teacher."

I would like Taxpayer to explain how it should be regulated so as to be a safeguard to the professional teacher; if, as he says, teachers during their first three years of service give better satisfaction than afterwards.

He then says that I charged the government with reckless expenditure of public moneys. Now, Mr Editor, I made so such charge; but I did say that the Liberal Government was largely to blame for the increase in the cost of education, because they have caused about 30 new schools to be opened, thereby greatly lowering the average attendance. It is all very well for "Taxpayer" to say "let the teachers who are dissatisfied leave the profession" because an injustice has been done to the profession. Would it not be much better to have the wrong redressed than to have the teachers leave the profession; even though some political drones should be forced to leave the hive. If "Taxpayer" is so well pleased with the action of the government why does he not say that he is willing to be taxed in the same proportion as the 579 teachers of this province and that \$270,000 should be raised by the government as taxes.
