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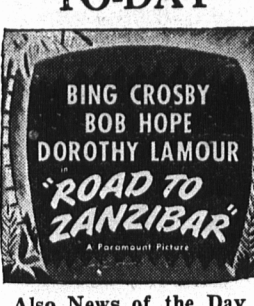

ment was "making hewers of wood and drawers of water" of Conservatives by putting them in minor positions when they wanted the work done.

Reminding his listeners that the "one and most necessary thing at this time is the winning of the war," Dr. McMillan warned against the "feeling of complacency" which is too prevalent in this country despite the fact that Prime Minister Churchill and high-ranking military men had called for a united and supreme effort to win the war. After three years of war there is still need for great sacrifice of manpower before Hitler will be beaten.

Second Front Agitation

Pointing to the great toll taken at Dieppe to find out the cost of opening a second front, he stated that he was "tired of listening to agitation saying it was time to open a second front." In his opinion Wendell Wilkie, who has been urging this second front, was speaking out of turn and should have remained quiet on the matter. "This sort of talk was not adding to our cause" and the effect of such statement is not helping the war. He pointed to the great material assistance being given to Russia in the matter of equipment being supplied by Britain and the United States.

He referred to the attitude taken by the National Conservative party when the manpower plebiscite was called. On that occasion the party backed the government. He pointed out, not to save McKen- zing's face, that of his own government but to save Canada's face. He spoke of the propaganda being sent to the province of Quebec by the Nazis who utilized the radio of Vichy. For this reason Rt. Hon. R. B. Hanson and the Provincial Conservative leaders used their influence to present a united front.

The Federal Government "never when it tried to help the war effort until the Conservatives and newspapers forced them." He criticized the King government for its spect and attitude which "didn't hesitate to form a national government and carry on the affairs of war wisely and well."

Need Principles for which the Conservative party stand are the principles which will be needed to rebuild this great nation. Such principles were declared at Port Hope by Dr. McMillan at the recent Conservative meeting held at Port Hope which appears to have done some good.

He spoke of the efforts he had put forth to endeavor to have the C. C. A. in Charlottetown and in N. B. left in Charlottetown and removed to Moncton on the subject. In this telegram protesting signed a joint letter to the government in charge of making such a move. In this connection he mentioned the fact that Col. Dr. McMillan and these men are condemned when they speak of the rights of this province."

Hon. Dr. McMillan stated that the Provincial Liberal party is "still going on in its old drum way." He said there are many things he could say about the local Legislature during their present term of office but particularly to their action in connection with the ceiling price on potatoes.

When this ceiling was placed on potatoes last spring at the delegation waited on the Government the Premier took the attitude that it was "not in the interests of Provincial Legislature." Hon. Douglas McMillan and Mr. J. L. Douglas are responsible, he said. On this occasion he protested and pointed out that the farmer is in an impossible position, had the right to come to the government. As a result a committee was appointed and sent to Ottawa and it obtained a valuable concession.

The matter of grants to the local

exhibition was also referred to by the speaker. The government planned to do away with these grants but he pointed out that exhibitions were being increased in other parts of the Maritimes and these should be continued to encourage farming. This time the government restored the grants placing them in the supplementary.

Dr. McMillan scored the action of the Liberal farmers in both these instances. They were "grits first and farmers after," he declared.

Referring to the suddenness of the last election he cautioned those present not to be caught unprepared again. He warned the new executive to see that conventions were called and nominations made this fall. There is no guarantee that there would not be an election next March or April, he said.

Congratulations were extended to the splendid address which he had delivered. Dr. McMillan said that some might take objection to his recent appointment but explained that his association with the country and the Empire and he was carrying on a necessary work towards winning the war.

Dr. McMillan's address followed the President's address which was delivered by Mr. Turner. This appears below.

Name Suggested

The meeting suggested the name of W. S. Grant F. W. Turner as the provincial delegate to attend the Conservative convention to be held at Ottawa in the near future. However, it was pointed out that the county associations make it difficult to confirm the suggestion before it was finally decided.

During the period devoted to resolutions a letter from Mr. Earl MacDonald was read in connection with the proposed transfer of the C. N. R. Accountability Department to Moncton. This communication protested this centralization which, he said, did not necessarily mean saving to the Railway but caused inconvenience to those affected. It asked that the representatives delve into the whole situation and progress of the war and the vital issues at stake. PRESIDENT TURNER'S ADDRESS

In his opening remarks President Turner reviewed briefly the progress of the war and the vital issues at stake. "He emphasized that we face the coming year with new friends and allies, strong and powerful, with new courage and the knowledge of our cause and the knowledge that the Giver of life will be our Guide." He then continued:

"But while the people of Canada were willing to do their part while the men of the fighting world were preparing and longing for the day when they would come to grips with the enemy, Mr. McKenzie King the Prime Minister was subjecting this country to the humiliating spectacle of voting on a plebiscite to determine whether Parliament would be given authority to mobilize the manpower of this country for a vote on another exhibition of that moral cowardice which has characterized his every act since assuming power. The House leader of the Conservative Party, the Hon. R. B. Hanson, with a true sense of his responsibility as a true Canadian the head of His Majesty's loyal Opposition enhanced his already great responsibility by requesting the Conservative government to support the forthcoming Victory Loan campaign which takes place next month. The Provincial objective would be in the vicinity of \$2,000,000, he said.

Resolutions

Following is the text of the resolutions adopted:

"Be it resolved that this convention re-affirm our deep loyalty to the British Sovereign and the Empire and the untimely death of our King, the Duke of Kent on active service and extend to all the members of the Royal Family our sincere sympathy in their loss in the line of duty."

Mr. F. S. Reeves, Southport, was the mover of this resolution while Mr. W. J. Gibson, Marshfield was the seconder.

Mr. W. S. Grant, Prince Edward Island has the proud distinction of supplying the names of the men and women who have served in the armed forces of the Dominion.

"And whereas Prince Edward Island has also the high boast of contributing according to its ability to the Red Cross and other kindred war charities than any other part of the Dominion."

"And whereas Prince Edward Island has received less consideration with regard to the distribution of war contracts than any other province of the Dominion."

"And whereas many of our young men and women have left this province to seek employment in war production in the other provinces where the remuneration is so lucrative."

"Be it therefore resolved that the Conservative electors of Queen's County in annual convention assembled approve the action of our Federal representatives at Ottawa in not pressing for our rightful share of war contracts and also for the lack of any employment for our young men and women not eligible for military service who are forced to leave their homes and farms to work on production in the other provinces and in many cases will not return thus losing to our province some of our best citizens."
