On December 22nd last Constables Stark and Shand of the R.N.W.M. Police, accompanied by Sam Adams, left for the Grand Eddy on the McLeod River, via Lac Ste. Anne and about 150 miles distant from that place. Their mission was to capture a rancher named Hornbach who had reached there with about fifty horses from Cochrane and who had gone insane from loneliness, losses of his horses, and the cold. The report of his condition had been brought to Lac Ste. Anne by an Indian, who reported that the rancher had refused to eat and was in immediate danger from starvation and cold. For a long time after their departure no word was received of the constables and it was thought they had gone astray or failed to capture their man. Corporal Munroe and Constable Dowlen not long ago went in search of the former party. They were joined by a guide at Lac Ste. Anne. Later advices have told of the finding of Hornbach who had been killed by relatives in self-defence. The second party found the first one all right. The Corporal Munroe referred to is a native of Albany Plains, and a brother of the late George Munroe formerly well known in this city.

MANY readers of The Guardian will recollect the Rev. Fred E. J. Lloyd at one time attached to St. Peter's Church in this City and a former rector of Georgetown and Cherry Valley. A recent Boston despatch has the following: "It is reported that the Rev. Fred E. J. Lloyd, D. D., Rector of St. Peter's Church, Uniontown, Pa., in the diocese of Pittsburgh, a missionary of considerable ability, has announced his conversion to the Roman communion and has abandoned his orders. Dr. Lloyd has been a figure of considerable prominence in the church, having been elected bishop coadjutor of Oregon in 1900. A protest against his election was made on frivolous grounds, and the Living Church defended Dr. Lloyd in the contention. Grave rumors affecting his past life, such as would demand careful investigation afterward became current, and Dr. Lloyd declined the election and was not a candidate when the next election was held. He has, however, been instrumental of much good in preaching missions in many parts of the country. Dr. Lloyd is a Welshman by birth and was educated for the ministry at Dorchester Missionary College, Oxford, and was ordained deacon by the late Bishop Mackensess of Oxford in 1892. He remained in deacon's orders for four years, during which time he was missionary in Labrador and Newfoundland, and was advanced to the priesthood by the late Bishop Williams of Quebec in 1896. He filled various Canadian cures until 1894, when he came to the United States and has successively been rector of Bloomington, Ill., Hamilton, Ohio, Gallipolis, Ohio, St. Mark's, Cleveland, and since 1903, at St. Peter's, Uniontown, Pa."

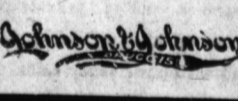
