## Inkerman Blanks St. Mary's 8-0 In Second Game Of Junior Series

OTTAWA, March 23—(CP)—Inkerman Rockets, Ottawa and District junior champions, tonight blanked Halifax St. Mary's, Maritime junior champions, 8-0 in the second game of a best-of-five quarter-final series for the Eastern Canada junior hockey title.

The Rockets won the first game 13-3. The third and perhaps final game of the series will be played here Friday. The winner will battle the Quebec junior champions in the semi-final round, with the survivor to meet Ontario Hockey Association champions in the final bracket for the title.

The Rockets outplayed the Maritimers in every frame, but Marty Barry's St. Mary's fought back gamely until the final whistle.

Ernie Yeardon replaced Ronnie Cole between the pipes for Halifax for the second game of the series. He played a stand-out game, stopping the rubber from all angles, but he was given little support by the defence. Rocket snipers roamed around the net.

## Edge Out Saints 10-9 In Final Game Before Largest Crowd Of Season

Walter Lawlor's Navy pucksters won the City Hockey League championship at the Forum last night by downing the Saint Dunstan's University squad by a close 10-9 count in the third and deciding game of the playoff finals. It was the last game to be played on Forum ice this year with a crowd of nearly 1,200 fans in attendance, the largest to witness a City League match this year.

It was a thrilling, well played encounter and one that was packed full of action all the way, and produced a really clean brand of hockey which only saw two minor penalties handed out.

The game opened up at a rapid pace right from the whistle, with Navy jumping out in front at the 23 second mark when Joey LeClair banged one home on a passing attack with Strain. But the Saints came roaring right back to the attack when Deignan banged in their first goal on a passing play with Ledwell at 1:31.

Forcing the attack from that point on, however, the Navy took control of the play and consistently hemmed the Saints in behind their own blue line to rap in five more goals before the sixteen-minute mark had been reached, with the Saints tallying once more in the closing minute of the frame, to see the Navy take a 6-2 lead on the play.

The Saints came back strong in the middle canto, however, to outshoot the Navy 3-1, and hold a good margin on the play, with Joe Mahar pulling the hat trick in the early part of the frame to bang home two goals in a row, the first coming at 7:26 on a smart solo effort from the opposing blue line, and the second just 14 seconds later on a passing attack in front of the net with Farmer. Both goals were scored while the Navy were playing one man short when MacGregor went off for slashing. Ted Strain got the Navy's lone tally of the period on a pass from Higson from a faceoff to the left of the Saint's net. Carl MacDonald cut the Navy lead down to only two goals, to garner his first of four goals on the night's play, when he made a snappy solo rush from his own blue line to skate through the whole Navy squad for a very pretty goal.

The tally came at 17:47 to end the scoring for the period.

The Navy started the ball rolling again in the final frame, when Johnny Higson picked up a loose puck inside his opponents' blue line to slip the puck behind goal. Strain at the 1:25 mark to put his team out in front by three goals, but the Saints retaliated at 4:35 when Houde and MacDonald combined on a nice attack from centre ice, the former driving home a hard shot. The tally was the start of a pressure attack by Saints who banged in two more goals by the time the 14-minute mark in the period had been reached to tie up the score at 8-8.

Reg Rodgers got the first at 12:24 when he teamed up with Houde on a passing attack in front of the net, with Carl MacDonald getting his second of the period less than a minute later when he and Houde combined on a smart passing play from centre ice.

From then on both teams broke wide open, with both pulling some really smart passing attacks that had the crowd on their feet most of the time. Johnny Higson broke the deadlock at 16:53 when he banged in Art Perry's pass from behind the net, with Wally Sheppard following it up with another two minutes later when he scored on a neat three man attack with Carver and Dowling to put the Navy two goals in front again.

The Saints battled desperately from that point on in an effort to regain the deficit, and came very close to doing so on a number of occasions, with Carl MacDonald finally rapping one in at 19:08 on a passing attack with Rodgers inside the Navy blue line. But the Navy held on grimly to their one goal advantage for the remaining seconds of play, although the Saints were holding

the play right in around their net when the gong sounded to end the game.

Johnny Davis turned in an exceptionally good performance in the Navy nets, and made some standout saves in various stages throughout the game, and was particularly hot in the second and third frames when the Saints were at their best in pressing forward attacks.
