WOMAN CANDIDATE FOR SEAT IN HOUSE PEBLY, Sask., July 24.—Mrs. M. O. Ramsland, the first woman in Saskatchewan to aspire to a seat in the Legislature, outlined her platform Tuesday night. Mrs. Ramsland is a Liberal candidate, and her platform consists of all pledges made by her late husband, thoroughly endorsing the Liberal programme. She expresses herself as being entirely in accord with Government ownership of railroads, and stated that tariff questions would occupy her attention considerably. Her stand on the educational question, however, is presumed to be one of the main planks of her platform. Mrs. Ramsland's opponent is Walter Whelan, independent candidate soldier, backed by the Conservative party, although running as an independent. Concerning her opposition to a returned soldier, Mrs. Ramsland stated that she was thoroughly patriotic, and that there were five cases of soldiers being deflected at polls. She felt herself to better qualified to handle the educational problem than her opponent, she said, having herself been a school teacher.

FRENCH TRAITOR IS DENOUNCED PARIS, July 24.—The trial of the traitor Richard, who was instrumental in causing the arrest and execution of M. Jacques at Lille during the German occupation, has begun. M. Muchard, an auxiliary army doctor, gave evidence before the court-martial yesterday that he was one of a party of French soldiers arrested by Richard's treachery at the Hotel Mosen, Antwerp, in July 1915. There was a moving scene in court when Madame Jacques entered, dressed in deep mourning. "The first time I saw Richard," she said, "was when he was introduced by a friend to solicit our committee 'to help the Allied soldiers in hiding to escape through the German lines.' The second time was on the day my husband was arrested. Standing behind the curtain of my window I saw him pacing the street in front of our house. A moment afterwards German Detectives Schmitt and Meyer entered and searched our house. A few days later I was called by Schmitt who said to me: 'Richard is the man who betrayed Jacques,' and he showed me a dossier on the margin of which was written: 'Louis Richard, lance-Corporal of Rennes.' "The third day I saw Richard was on the day of my husband's condemnation. He was standing beside Detective Meyer, and was on excellent terms with him. The fourth time I saw Richard, was, when, after the execution of my husband, Schmitt had me called to hand me various papers. Richard was standing near at a table. It was in the Hotel Royal. Schmitt pointed him out to me with the words 'That's the man who gave M. Jacques away.' I asked Schmitt 'What will be done with this man after the war?' Schmitt replied: 'If it only depended on me I would hand him over at once, but for the moment he has been useful to us.' Then amid a deep silence Madame Jacques stretched her arms and cried: 'Richard is a coward. You coward, you've caused the father of five children to be shot. Confess your cowardice.' Then, after turning towards the Court of Justice, she swung round in a final burst of indignation, on Richard, and said: 'You wretch, my poor husband did his duty, but you have not done yours.' "One of Madame Jacques's daughters also gave evidence, and she, too before she left the court hurled her maledictions at the wretched prisoner with the words: 'You caused four innocent people to be shot. When will your turn come?' It may be added that Richard was accused of many other similar acts of treachery. For only one period of the occupation there are in the dossier eighty-five letters of denunciation written by him.

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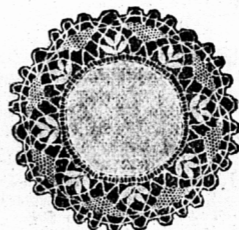
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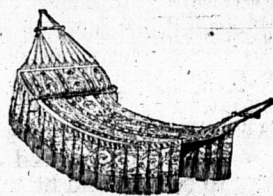

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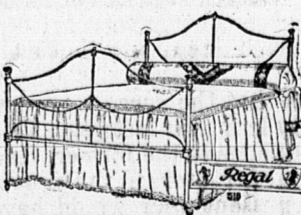

COST OF REARING Regarding the cost of rearing store cattle, the cost of keeping the cow is not nearly such a serious matter as it is with the dairy cow. A cow need not get any extra feeding, unless for a short period after calving, and if she calve about March or April this period need not be an extended one. Where calves of the right class can be bought, one cow or two, and do better to them by suckling, than can be done by hand when the labor bill is considered. Some men are doing well using only what might be considered as cheap cross cows, counting largely on the influence of the bull to produce good feeders of quality and fattening ability. But for best results the best beef bulls should be mated with cows of a good beef type not necessarily pure bred. And also though the beef cow can be kept much cheaper than the dairy cow, reducing her winter feed to a straw ration while exposing her in the outside during cold spells, is not at any time or under any market conditions conducive to a favorable bank balance. The work of the feeder is devoted to the adding, by his feeding process, such amounts of fat over the body of the animal and through the muscular tissues as will give tenderness, flavor, and juiciness to the various beef cuts. It is the business of the feeder to so change the nature of the carcass, that the animal from being worth 8c or 10c per lb. live weight will after 4 to 6 months in the feed lot be worth 12c to 14c per lb. Thus a 900 lb. feeder steer at 10c costs \$90; a finished steer of 1,200 lbs. at 13c, sells at \$156. This gain or difference is got from the increase in weight and the spread in price. A difference of opinion exists among buyers of feeders whether they should purchase smaller steers at a lower price per lb., that will take longer to finish, or larger and fatter steers at a higher price that can be finished in short time. Circumstances largely shape the course to be pursued. A man having plenty of rough feed, as straw, ensilage, roots, etc., but a minimum of grain might choose long-keep steers, feed them cheaply through the winter and finish them on grass. Others prefer short keep steers. They finish quickly, can be sold in a short time, which gives a quick turn over of the investor's money. He can buy another lot of quick feeders, which in their turn can be sent quickly to the butcher. The feeding of short keep steers requires more grain and greater care than in the case of the thinner, steers. The spread is not so great either, but on the other hand the quick sales and rapid turn over compensates for this. The basis of profitable steer feeding is animals of undoubted beef quality and growthiness. Added to this proper care and regular feeding of ordinary feeds as found on the farm should give fair profits. Trying to make profits out of expensive feeds by feeding them to a bunch of cows that are crosses of the dairy breeds is as comparable with the dairy farmer who feeds these expensive feeds to cows that average 4,600 to 5,000 pounds of milk. But there are lots of farmers in this business, and it is no wonder they demand better prices for their products.—O. V. J.

Cutworm Killing Cutworms which pass the winter as partially-grown larvae are generally starved out by fall plowing, as their food is turned under. White grubs are destroyed more easily by deep, fall plowing because this insect burrows nearly to the plow-depth line during October, and being turned up at that time cannot liberate again before winter sets in.
