SUN DECK FROM PORCH ROOF SIMPLE
 It is a simple matter to convert the roof of a porch into a second floor sun deck, and the improvement would be one that the entire family could enjoy. A railing around the outer edge of the roof would be necessary. A wooden balustrade would be sufficient, but for a larger and more expensive home a wrought-iron railing may be desirable. Besides what structural changes may be necessary in the roof itself, all that would remain to be done would be installation of some suitable floor covering and provision of an entrance to the sun deck from the house.

Would Use Transport Planes in Emergency

OTTAWA, June 4.—(CP)—In a military emergency, the 15 big transport planes of Trans-Canada Air Lines would be turned over to the Royal Canadian Air Force immediately, but there is little prospect of such an eventuality, Transport Minister Howe said in parliament today.

"But if the time comes when these 15 planes can be used for military purposes to better advantage than operating the Trans-Canada system they will be converted at once," the Minister said.

The T.C.A. is equipped with all-metal, low-wing Lockheed 14 monoplane with retractable landing gear. Two engines propel the airliners at 200 miles an hour with 10 passengers, mail and express, and the crew—a pilot, co-pilot and stewardess. The planes are red, striped of luxury furnishings and seats, and converted quickly into bombers, reconnaissance or patrol planes.

The T.C.A. planes are ready, sister ships of the Lockheed Hudson bomber-reconnaissance planes recently built in large quantities for the British and Canadian air forces and also for Australia. The military version of the Lockheed has a gun turret and transparent windows in the nose for a bomber-observer.

Rev. Herbert M. Buntain Induction Service

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island ordained Mr. Herbert M. Buntain, of New Glasgow, at the service held recently at the Tyne Valley Presbyterian Church. Previous to the public service the Presbytery examined the candidate for ordination.

A large congregation assembled to witness an interesting and impressive procedure.

Rev. W. O. Rhoad presided as acting Moderator.

The scripture lesson, Acts 15, was read by Rev. Thomas Goodwill, of Canoe Cove.

Rev. G. C. Webster led in public prayer.

The sermon was preached by Mr. Goodwill, who spoke from the text Psalm 27:3. David passed through conflict and difficulties because he had good foundations for faith. God was his life.

During periods like that through which we are now moving there are people who lose whatever superficial faith they have had. The present test may, as a result, be bringing the people to a sincere and healthier belief in God.

God was also David's salvation. Likewise our world will turn to the Father for His saving grace. We must let God be our strength just as he was the strength of the great characters of bible history.

The steps leading up to the appointment of the candidate were narrated by Rev. William VerWolfe, of Summerside.

Rev. Dr. A. O. Thompson of Brookfield and Hunter River, addressed the Minister following the ordination by the laying on of hands.

Dr. Thompson called for the emulation of the early apostles who were subject to the pentecostal spirit. The minister must be diligent in his preaching and in his pastoral duties. Words of encouragement to the laity are especially valuable. Furthermore, the work of teaching is one of the highest vocations by which the minister can serve his people.

The charge to the congregation was delivered by Rev. Mr. VerWolfe.

The speaker said that the church in general is weakened because the members have forgotten that they are stewards of God. The work of the church cannot go on unless the people make themselves responsible for the up-keep of the church. We should give voluntarily. God does not treat us as machines. A man should have purpose in his life. A coin thrown in a plate is not purposed unless it is accompanied by meditation and expectation. Money is not an offering or perverse source from a grudging or expectant heart. Let us give systematically. Do so with the start of a system at the moment of our giving. "Good actions and thoughtful management are essential," said Mr. VerWolfe.

The speaker strongly advocated the use of duplex envelopes for every congregation. It is easier to give 25c a week than to dig down deep for \$3.00 to meet the equivalent for the period. At least it is 1940 to give gratefully. By giving our gifts we help to show that we have first given our hearts.

The congregation came forward to welcome the new minister, who has come as a recent graduate from McGill.

Both minister and people look forward to a happy pastoral experience.

Other members of the Presbytery present were: Rev. R. H. Stavert and Rev. Mr. Wadland. Rev. Mr. Buntain has taken over the charge of Richmond Bay congregation.

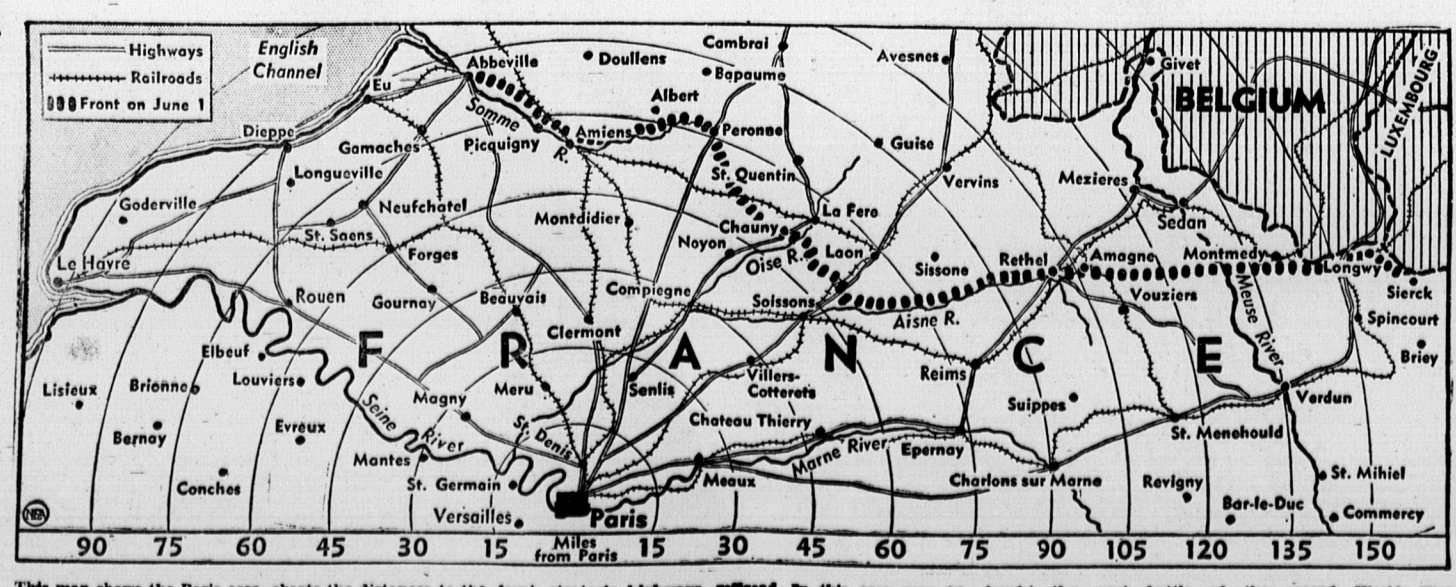
