The Premier And His Shadow

(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, June 18—"I hope Mr. Bonar Law was well enough, yesterday morning, to read Lord Beaverbrook's fine tribute to his old friend in his hour of tragic illness," says Mr. London in The London Daily Graphic.
"Beautifully phrased and cleverly analytical, it erred certainly on the side of eulogy, for it called the ex-Premier 'the greatest Conservative Prime Minister since Disraeli.'"
"But it recorded intimacies that must have told hundreds of thousands of people, for the first time, of the endearing personality which Bonar Law hides behind his austere modesty."
"It is certainly a remarkable story—that of two poor boys, living near to each other in an obscure part of Canada, who came to England—one to have a Premier ship thrust upon him, the other to that Premier's adviser behind the scenes, the one working in the limelight, the other pulling the strings, unknown to almost everybody in the country."
"Lord Beaverbrook's influences over Lloyd George's life was considerable; the effect of his coming to England must have changed many things in Bonar Law's career."
"I wonder what Lord Beaverbrook's influence will be upon politics in the future."
