The latest news, first of all.

The new organ for the First Methodist Church has arrived in the city.

The mail train arrived in this city at 10.30 Saturday evening, forty minutes late. Other trains were on time.

The S. S. Harland leaves here today for Orwell at 1 p. m., calling at Vernon River Bridge, China Point and Halliday's Wharf, returning tomorrow morning, due at 9.45.

Rev. H. E. Thomas of Charlottetown will occupy the pulpit of Exmouth Street Methodist Church tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. W. Brewer, will preach in the evening.—St. John Telegraph, 10th.

The S. S. Bonavista arrived here from Montreal Saturday evening at five o'clock with a number of passengers and a large general cargo. Her outward cargo from here consisted of 1,300 bags of oats, 130 bags of potatoes, 150 boxes of vegetables, 125 bales of hay, 50 head of cattle, 1 horse, 100 sheep and sundry other cargo. There were seven outward passengers from Charlottetown to Sydney and St. John's, Nfld.

The Morning Chronicle in referring to the death of Mrs. Haggart, so well known here, says: The death occurred Friday at her residence, No. 14 Pleasant Street, of Mrs. Annie Haggart, aged 90 years, a very highly respected and well known South End lady. Mrs. Haggart was a native of Halifax, being Miss Darby, and her father was active in politics in the days of Howe. She was twice married, her first husband being Dr. Humphrey, who was a member of the firm which had the Octagon building on Upper Water Street. Some years after the doctor's death she married Peter Haggart, a well-known retired business man, and they lived a great portion of their time in Edinburgh. After Mr. Haggart's death, his widow took up her permanent residence here, spending a portion of the summers in Musquodoboit. Notwithstanding her age, Mrs. Haggart was quite active up to about two weeks ago when she met with an accident which doubtless hastened her death. She had been up town on her return home, dropped a pencil near the doorway. Stooping to pick up the pencil she slipped and fell, breaking one of her legs. The deceased lady was of a very kindly disposition, particularly towards the younger people, and she was a prime favorite with all the children in her vicinity. She was also a constant visitor to the sick, and not very long ago she walked from north of the Wellington Barracks to her residence at the South End of the city on the occasion of visiting a sick woman. Her sister, Mrs. Higgs, who lived with Mrs. Haggart, survives her and is the last member of the Darby family.
