It appears from the evidence that the deceased came to the boarding house of Mrs. Walker, 107 Richmond, where he formerly stayed, in a somewhat intoxicated condition about eight o'clock Thursday night. He made no disturbance, but in about half an hour went to sleep on a sofa in the house. He could not be aroused and the inmates telephoned to the Police Station, where he was taken by Officers Doyle and Biggar. Gaul had tried to get up while the telephone message was being sent, and fell on the floor. This was where the officers found him. They took him to the lockup and put him in a cell. He offered no resistance and seemed quite helpless. At 12.30 two other prisoners were placed in the same cell. Deceased was then lying on his right side and snoring. At 2 p. m. he was in the same position. At 4 o'clock, when Officer Biggar looked into the cell, Gaul turned over on his side. All three prisoners were "dead drunk."

Sergeant McInnis stated that he had looked in at the deceased several times during the night and could hear the deceased snoring. At seven o'clock one of the prisoners called him into the cell and he discovered that Gaul was dead.

Dr. Yeo gave the result of the autopsy performed by himself and Dr. Smith. A thorough examination revealed no evidence of organic disease. The stomach was dilated and contained a lot of liquid of a greyish color and some undigested food. There was a slight alcoholic odor. The inner wall of the stomach was of ordinary appearance except for a small patch in a hemorrhagic state, which was not sufficient to cause death.

The coroner, "Could you give the jury any evidence as to what caused death?"

Dr. Yeo: "From the history of the case I would say acute alcoholism—acute alcoholic poisoning. He had been drinking very bad liquor."

In view of the evidence the jury brought in their verdict as given above.

The deceased, who was seventy-five years of age, was unmarried. There are no relatives in the Province.

TELEPHONE LINES STILL OUT OF ORDER

Telephone communication throughout the province is still impossible owing to broken wires and snapped poles. The telephone crews are making every effort to restore service as soon as possible and are at present working on the more important lines in an effort to re-establish communication with the mainland. Between Summerside and Charlottetown 171 poles are down, many of which are smashed in two and turned upside down in the fields. Conditions in the eastern part of the province are reported to be slightly better than in western sections, but as yet no long distance lines are working.

Emergency Repair To A Spring

A spring which breaks on the road may seriously inconvenience the driver especially if it is a front spring, as the steering will be affected. There is a way to make a temporary repair which will serve until a replacement can be made. If there is a large, flat wrench in the tool box, place it over the break in the spring and bind it lightly with many turns of wire. If a wrench is not available, a tire iron will answer. Careful driving will be necessary, as the wire may be broken if a hole in the road is struck while traveling at any but a slow speed.

Abegweits And New Glasgow In Fast, Close Game

Visitors Nose Locals Out By 2 To 1 Score Annexing Their Winning Count In the Second Period.

Playing an excellent brand of hockey considering the earliness of the season the juvenile Abegweit team held the much-touted New Glasgow sextette down to a 2-1 score at the Arena last night. Every department of the game was marked by brilliant play, both combination and solo runs featuring Charlottetown fans were immensely pleased with the showing of the young local team, and many old timers were heard to comment favorably on the quality of the Abegweit combination, which was a constant menace to the Nova Scotians' net.

An excellent defensive game on the part of the visitors, coupled with splendid poke checking by Boston, the centre was mainly responsible for the firmness of the Abegweits' goals, without wishing to detract from the credit due visitors' goalie, Barber, Saunders, Lawlor, Nicholson, Acorn and Power were outstanding players on the local line-up. The first named was responsible for the Abegweits' lone tally on a pass from McLellan, star defense man. When the second period was ten minutes old, New Glasgow scored one goal in the first period after twelve minutes of play "Paddy" Nolan doing the trick on a wing shot, and one counter in the second on a solo rush by Beaton, tricky New Glasgow centre after twelve minutes of play. The winning tally was a beautiful wing shot which completely baffled McEwen, who nevertheless turned in an excellent game. Bubar, the visitors' goalie, was called upon to save twenty-five shots to McEwen's eleven. The game throughout was marked by exceptionally clean play, there being only six penalties in the three periods.

FIRST HALF

The first period opened with each team apparently feeling the other out. The first few minutes was featured by a series of off side plays. Breaking out of this rut both teams played an excellent combination in which Abegweit checking in the defensive zone was especially noticeable. The Abegweit goal was seriously threatened on several occasions. Saunders and Nicholson were playing a flashy game for the locals, both in solo rushes and in combination plays. THIRD PERIOD

In spite of the soft ice the period opened with a whirlwind start. "Hockey" Nicholson and "Pat" Power were the stars of this section of the game.
