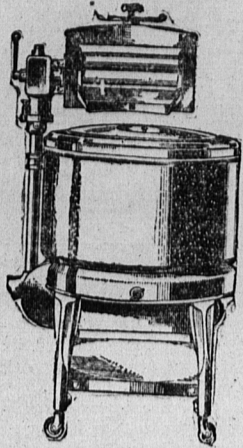

## Students Close Mt'l. Walkathon

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Sept. 27—A drastic halt was called tonight to the walkathon which, despite court action, has seen its weary contestants drag themselves around a wooden floor here all summer. Three hundred and fifty youths, declared by police to be students of the University of Montreal, took the law into their own hands, aided the building, routed contestants, promoters and spectators from the building and disrupted the organization of the competition. Armed with sticks, stones and a succulent collection of ripe and overripe vegetables the students broke into the building, situated near St. Laurent, a town outside the city limits of Montreal, just as the evening's entertainment was at its height. A band was playing and rabid fans were cheering on their favorites. Suddenly vegetables rained on the floor; windows were smashed and the place was in an uproar. One man was hurt when struck on

the head by a brick. Organizers hustled away the competitors who were still shuffling out their monotonous grind when last seen in the excitement.

A riot alarm call was sounded in Montreal police headquarters when walkathon authorities appealed for aid but they were told the local police had no jurisdiction. Headquarters of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police were notified while Provincial Police sent a squad to the scene in an effort to restore order.

When the contestants disappeared, the students tore down flags and decorations on and around the building and milled around determined the show would not go on.

The competitors have been walking for weeks. Provincial Police closed the walkathon temporarily on August 5, when the organizers claimed it had been in action 168 hours, but the promoters claimed they had permission from Ottawa authorities to hold the event and it was reopened.

#### MRS. GEORGE MCPHEE

P. E. Island and O'Leary particularly by the sad death of Mrs. George McPhee, who passed away at her home on Sept. 18th, aged 61 years.

Born in Lot 11 to Mr. and Mrs. Aitken Bryan, the deceased spent forty years of her life in that district, and the latter twenty-one years in O'Leary. Her nine children, Mrs. George Mercer, Mrs. Harry McPhee, Mr. Aitken McPhee, (all of Boston); Mrs. S. Butler, Mrs. D. Crawford, (Frankingham, Mass.); Mrs. R. Arbing, O'Leary; Mrs. Alden McPhee, Malden, Mass.; Miss Cordean McPhee and Miss Florence McPhee, were all present at the funeral, which took place on Sept. 21st. Services were held in the deceased's residence and Lot 11 Episcopal Church in which churchyard she was laid to rest—but her soul goes marching on. Funeral services were in charge of the Rev. W. J. Phillips, Rector of St. Peter's, Alberton, assisted by Rev. Mr. Coleman, Rev. J. W. Turpel and the Rev. G. Evan Thomas, (who is engaged to the late Mrs. McPhee's youngest daughter Florence).

Indeed, this characteristic trait is not lacking throughout the family, for her brother, a P. E. Islander, the Rev. Dr. J. Ingram Bryan, is a distinguished professor in the Imperial University, Yokohama, Japan, whose articles are known to thousands and frequently appear in The Halifax Herald.

#### ALLAN MCLEAN LAID TO REST AT SCOTTSVILLE

The community of Scottsville, Lake Ainslie, was saddened on Monday, Sept. 18th, when it became known that a life long resident, Allan D. McLean, had passed away. Born there about 96 years ago, his entire life was spent in that district where he led an exemplary Christian life and was respected by all who had his acquaintance. His wife predeceased him 19 years ago. They had one son who died suddenly at Orangevale while returning from the United States about 35 years ago. Three years ago he left the old homestead and took up residence with his nephew, Dan McKay, near by. He was the oldest member of a family of 14, of whom 4 survive, viz: Mrs. Christy McDonald, Peters Road, P. E. I.; Mrs. Alex McLean; Boston; Mrs. Samuel Murchison, and Mrs. Margaret McFadyen, Sydney. He is also survived by a large number of nephews and nieces and other relatives. The late Donald McLean, shoemaker, was a brother. He was a life long member of the Presbyterian Church.

The funeral was held on Wednesday from his late residence where the large assemblage bore testimony to the place he held in the hearts and lives of the people. The services in the house were conducted by Rev. A. S. McLean, former pastor in the English language, assisted by Rev. A. D. Mackinnon, Whyccomagh, in Gaelic. Both clergymen took part in the final obsequies in the East Lake Cemetery, where all that was mortal of a fine Christian gentleman was interred beside his beloved wife and son who had predeceased him years ago.
