THE MARKET.—The market yesterday was poorly attended. Butter sold at from 4 to 4 1/2; eggs, 50c; chickens, from \$1.25 to \$2.00; one lone goose, small size, was being offered for \$2.50; apples sold at 12c and 15c per doz. Pork was being bought at 12c, best quality. Other grades as usual. Buyers are complaining about the quantity of small and thin hogs which are being offered and which are highly injurious to the trade.

STRANGE DISCOVERY.—When Mr. Layton McCabe of Alexandria was dressing a hog for market a few days ago his knife struck something hard and upon investigation he found a large steel nail firmly imbedded in the side of the pig. Mr. McCabe said the animal showed no signs of discomfort and fattened just as readily as the other pigs, although the nail showed evidence of having been there for sometimes, probably swallowed while feeding.

SUPREME COURT.—At the Supreme Court yesterday in the case of W. Sheek and Macdonald v. James Stewart & Co., the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for \$857.00. At the afternoon session the case of Daniel J. McDonald vs. W. E. O'Connell, alleged libelation with defamations, came up before Mr. Justice Arsenault. Benoit K. C. and Johnston K. C. for plainiff, Stewart K. C. and Luman K. C. for defendant. The plaintiff, D. J. McDonald and his sister Laura McDonald were on the witness stand. The Court adjourned until 10:30 this morning.
