English Girl is 2000th C. W. A. C.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 23 — (CP) — For the second time in her life Margaret Robble of London, Eng., has sworn allegiance to the King and donned khaki. Recently she became the 2000th girl to join the CWAC in M.D. 10 and was personally attested by Brig. R. O. G. Morton, district officer commanding. She will be the first CWAC to wear four red service chevrons by virtue of her four years service with the Auxiliary Territorial Service, Britain's older sister of the C.W.A.C. She will also wear the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and maple leaf clasp. Margaret is as pretty as the landscape in her native England. She's pleasant, intelligent and charming. And her name wasn't always Robble. It used to be Driscoll.

One hectic night, when the blitz was blazing in London, Margaret took shelter in a New Zealand forces canteen. There she met a Winnipeg N.C.O. named Henry Robble. Three months later she was Mrs. Robble—married during an air raid.

After Dunkirk, Margaret could no longer resist the urge to join. Although she was two years under age she enlisted in the Auxiliary Territorial Service in October, 1940. Later they found out she was only 16 and out she went.

Then, after her home was blitzed and her birth certificate and other evidence of her age were destroyed, she enlisted again. She served four years as a switchboard operator in the A.T.S. until she came to Canada with her husband. Margaret likes everything about Canada—the snow, lights and luxuries. "I like the people, they're very friendly." And although right now Pete Robble would like to share the hardships with her folks back home, she wants to be in Canada after the war.

URGES BETTER CARE FOR BRITISH BABIES
BRISTOL, Eng., Jan. 23 — (CP) — Britain is losing 4,000 child lives a year which could be saved, says Dr. R. H. Parry, medical health officer here. His suggested remedy: incubators for babies, human milk depots, and specialized medical attention like that provided in New Zealand. "For every 1,000 babies born, New Zealand is saving 100 more than any other part of the British Empire," said Dr. Parry in an interview. "In my annual report for Bristol I have to record the death of 120 babies in 1944, which is a low record. "But if we, in this country, had a similar scheme to that of New Zealand, I am confident we could have saved at least 100 of the 120."

Strong Post-War Plan For India Is Suggested

CALCUTTA, Jan. 22 — (CP) — A suggestion that the central, provincial and state governments in India enter a five-year coordinated plan of post-war development has been advanced by a central government reconstruction committee. One Indian economist wrote recently that India presents a picture of "retarded development and wasting assets." The committee's aim would be to change that situation, at the same time raising the national standard of living. To this end, the committee's second report suggests purchasing power of the people must be raised by increasing the productivity of labor and by simultaneous reorganization of agriculture industry and commerce. There must also be a wide extension of social services. But the report says the objective will not be reached unless coordinated development begins over activity and the central, provincial and state governments co-operate in the plan. It states that the steps must be taken to remove "the existing glaring anomaly of immense wealth and poverty." Special measures are considered necessary to improve the conditions of the backward classes and lower castes. Plans for development of various industries have been drawn up and published in India. They are now under study by the central and provincial governments. The agriculture plan for instance calls for doubling production within 16 years.

Husband And Wife Form Legal Team

MONTREAL, Jan. 22 — For the first time in court history here, a husband and wife appeared today as a legal team in a case before a Superior Court jury. They are Mr. and Mrs. Rover Lacoste, and she was one of the first women to be admitted to the practice of law in Quebec Province. Before the hearing opened, Mrs. Lacoste was welcomed to the court by Mr. Justice O. S. Tyndale and by Lionel Forsyth, one of the opposing lawyers. The case involved an action for damages of \$100,000 alleged to have been caused to William Wallace Watt and his wife by statements said to have been contained in a credit report issued by the Royal Credit Co. of Atlanta, Ga., to the Phoenix Insurance Co., Dec. 11, 1943.
