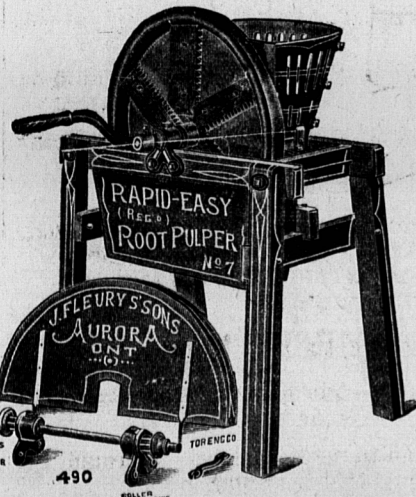

JUBILEE LECTURE

(Continued from page one) might indeed well thank God and take courage. The lecturer then passed from the review of the half century and dwelt for a while on the religious significance of the Jewish festivals. He described graphically the sounding of the jubilee trumpets on the tenth day of the seventh month and the music effect in opening every prison door, cancelling every mortgage and sending every scattered family back to the ancestral home. The Lord Jesus had adopted this figure as the keynote of His ministry. "The Lord hath anointed me," He said, "to preach deliverance to the captives; to bind up the broken-hearted; to preach the acceptable year of the Lord." This really meant a jubilee, an age of joy. The Gospel was really the proclamation of liberty, a haven of everlasting joy. His message was "The year of jubilee has come; return ye ransomed sinners home." The spirit of the year of jubilee is joy. The lecturer then proceeded to illustrate the value of cheerfulness, thankfulness and optimism in our Christian life. He spoke of the causes of happiness as largely moral and spiritual. We carry in our own hearts the secret of destiny and the sources of pain or pleasure. The Persian poet has said: "I sent my soul through the invisible, some problems of the future life to spell; and by and by my soul returned to me and answered—I myself an Heaven or Hell."

Three causes, he continued, especially contribute to real happiness. First is, thankfulness and contentment. A good many people are like the man who "growled at morning, noon, and night, and trouble sought to borrow; although today the skies were bright, he knew 'twould storm tomorrow." He gave numerous and humorous illustrations of misery and discontent and the delightfulness of cheerfulness, quoting many amusing epigrams. The next secret of happiness is unselfishness. Balzac tells of the man with the magic skin shrank, until at last through the but every time a wish was granted his skin shrank until at last, through the abundance of his blessings, he was literally squeezed to death. This is a true picture of the curse of selfishness. The way to find heaven is to forget oneself and live for others. Finally, the most potent secret of a joyful life, said Dr. Simpson, was trust. Harry Morehouse has written a fine aphorism founded upon a passage in the Epistle to the Philippians, which sums up the philosophy of Christian contentment: "Be careful for nothing, thankful for everything, thankful for anything." True faith will give us a victorious happiness when everything seems to be against us. A noted author has said: "It is easy enough to be pleasant when life goes by with a swing; but the man worth while is the man with a smile when everything goes dead wrong." This is more than temperament; it is a triumph of faith and true Christianity. The Great Pattern left us His noblest example when the shadows of Gethsemane and Calvary were gathering about him but "For the joy set before Him He endured the Cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the Throne of God." The great Apostle, his most successful follower, left us a similar testament. "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself that I may finish my course with joy." Concluding, Dr. Simpson said: "God help us to be followers of these noble leaders, and some glad day find that our light affliction which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory, and then may we all share forever more the Eternal Jubilee."

GOVERNMENT WILL HOLD ALL DIVIDENDS FOR ENEMY. LONDON, November 21.—The attorney-general, Sir John A. Simon, introduced in the house of commons today an interesting amendment to the act covering trading with the enemy. He said his aim was to stop the transmission of money or credits which would be advantageous to the enemy. Every body holding property in trust such as dividends, profits, etc., belonging to enemies of the empire in Germany, Austria and Turkey, would henceforth be required, under penalty, to pay these profits to a public trustee. The attorney-general explained that indiscriminate confiscation was not intended. "We are preserving the enemy's property until the end of the war," he said. "What will happen to it at the end of the war can very properly be decided then."
