S'ide Council Discusses Car Ferry Situation

Summerside Town Council should back Premier Jones in any effort he makes to have a new Car Ferry by next Fall, stated Councillor Gorrill last evening at the monthly meeting of Summerside Town Council. He spoke while moving a resolution authorizing that many of the civic officers be asked to write to the Hon. J. L. Ralston federal representative for Prince and to Premier Jones regarding having the work rushed so electric light boat may be ready for service this Fall. Councillor Gorrill further stated that his opinion if it were Ontario or Quebec that were affected they would have had a new boat before now. He suggested that the construction of the boat be completed earlier as "we can't go through another winter with the old boat."

Mayor Lidstone presided last evening at the Council meeting. Councillors Gorrill and Wedge were present. The following bills were passed: Town paid bills \$4,115.63; Town unpaid bills \$1,300.00; electric light unpaid bills \$1,671.51; electric light unpaid bills \$6,712.71.

The Town Clerk in reading the minutes of a special meeting held on Feb. 28 revealed that substantial raises in salary had been granted to several of the employees. A raise of \$5.00 a week was given all the operators at the electric light plant they now receive \$27 a week. The assistant engineer gets \$32 a week and the engineer was upped from \$1,800 to \$2,200 a year. The police force received raises amounting \$10 a month in each case. Their salaries now are: Chief White \$1,540 a year; Const. Wedge \$1,300 a year; Sergeant Schurman \$1,900 a year; Const. Heckbert \$1,240 a year. These salaries are plus uniform and two weeks vacation. Other salaries set are as follows: J. H. Strong, Town Clerk \$150 a month; Jean Nicholson stenographer \$14 a week; James Millman, street foreman \$24 a week; James Goas, Janitor \$18 a week.

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—A simple funeral for Irvin S. Cobb, humorist and author, who died Friday was held here today.

Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell, formerly of Winnipeg, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, read the 23rd Psalm and a verse from Robert Louis Stevenson, both requested in a letter written by Cobb before his death.

The letter, written in his best humor, said he wanted no mourning, no flowers, no funeral in the traditional sense.

Two spirituals, "Deep River," and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," also requested by Cobb, were played by Harry Gulliver, Church organist who was a neighbor of Cobb in Paduch, Ky.

The body will be cremated and Col. J. S. Bonnell, who was in the career where he began his newspaper work.

committee, said it had been necessary to close the men's toilet in the market building. The toilet will be cleaned and left for the exclusive use of tenants of the building. This seemed the only way of dealing with the situation.

Market Toll Schedule

He also brought in a new schedule of market tolls regulated and determined by the market committee. They do not apply to tenants of permanent stalls but to those occupying a portion of table space on market days, for which the present rates are, in most cases, very inadequate. Most butchers pay from \$1.00 to \$1.20 a day for this space, while market women pay only from 20 to 40 cents. The new schedule increases the tolls from 20 to 33 per cent. On motion of Coun. Rogers, seconded by Coun. MacDonald, the schedule was approved and prescribed, and the City Clerk authorized to have copies of the list printed and posted throughout the market building. General discussion followed as to the best means of disposing of the fish stalls. Coun. Rogers suggested establishing a flat price for each stall, and letting the tenants take care of them in rotation. He would like to see them rented to one dependable man, who would be responsible for their cleanliness and could sub-let them to others. No action was taken on this matter, which was discussed by Coun. McKee, Butler, MacDonald and McKee.

Coun. McKee, chairman of the light committee, brought in a resolution that the Maritime Electric Company be authorized to install lights on Victoria Park, on the dusk to dawn schedule from June 1 to Oct. 15.

Coun. MacDonald referred to a meeting which the light committee will shortly have with the manager of the Maritime Electric, to discuss a new schedule of rates. The rates charged the city for light installations are altogether too high, he said.

On motion of Coun. LePage, the City Clerk was instructed to call for applications for the position of assistant fire hall engineer. There

was a good deal of discussion on the inability of the city to pay the wages to its employees. Coun. MacDonald pointed out that with the existing tax rates, which the Council had decided to retain, the city expenditures must be curtailed. Coun. Rogers said he believed the existing rate was too low.

Coun. Dougan, chairman of the recreational committee, referred to a grant of \$1200 in the estimate for the coming year, which would be used to improve the playgrounds, for which the service clubs had asked.
