The Expert Says

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 (CP) - Green GROWS THE PARSLEY-OH! At least we hope it does for Nutrition Service tells us that a pot of parsley, flourishing on the kitchen window sill, is a veritable vitamin mine.

Families are sometimes funny about eating something they regard as decoration and a sprig of vitamins on a plate doesn't do anyone any good. However, turn the decoration into an ingredient by chopping it finely as the French do and sprinkling it over vegetables just before serving and it is accepted without comment.

JAM - JAM - Here's a recipe from the Consumer Section of the Dominion Department of Agriculture testing kitchen which you'll want to clip and keep handy for holiday entertaining. You'll like the Jam-Jams because the recipe makes about six dozen delicious cookies without undue strain on rationed ingredients:

1-2 cup mild flavored fat; 1 egg; 3-4 cup pastry flour or 3 cups all-purpose flour; 1-4 teaspoon baking soda; 1 teaspoon baking powder; 1-2 cup sour milk; 1-2 cup thick jam.

Crean the fat with the sugar thoroughly. Beat the egg and add, beating well, milk and sift the flour with baking soda and baking powder. Add to the fat, sugar and egg mixture alternately with the milk. Chill dough thoroughly. Roll out 1/8 inch thick and cut in two-inch round using a doughnut cutter for half the rounds.

Put together in pairs with the jam between and showing through the hole in the top round. Bake in a moderate oven, 30 degrees Fahrenheit for about 20 minutes.

Consumption Of Liquor Is Reported Up

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 (CP) - Canadian consumption of spirits, malt liquors and wines is estimated to have reached a new high point in the year ended March 31, 1943, and the Dominion Government's revenue from such beverages now is three times greater than at the end of the year. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported tonight.

Reports for the eight provinces in which liquor control boards operate showed revenues to have reached the highest point on prohibition since Edward Island has prohibited the sale of liquor.

The Bureau estimated that in the year ended March 31, 1943, Canadians consumed 4,963,023 proof gallons of spirits compared with 4,348,440 in the previous year and 3,433,964 in the fiscal year of 1939.

Gross sales of provincial liquor control boards, with net revenue in brackets, for the most recent fiscal year were: Nova Scotia, \$15,136,631 (\$4,888,365); New Brunswick, \$8,070,444 (\$2,960,957); Quebec, \$10,645,117 (\$3,074,417); Ontario, \$35,058,844 (\$10,088,065) (this was supplemented by sales of \$45,548,177 from breweries); Manitoba, \$9,983,323 (\$2,740,498); Saskatchewan, \$10,094,457 (\$2,407,066); Alberta, \$13,197,621 (\$3,897,178); British Columbia, \$20,969,956 (\$5,928,444).
