Notes by the Way

IT is argued that because one eating house was ill-conducted, all others should be put under a ban. That is the prohibition argument all over. Why not punish the keeper of the ill-conducted eating-house, and allow the others the liberty to which they are entitled? At present meals and refreshments are being supplied at prohibited hours on the sly—bootlegged, in fact—though not by recognized restaurants.

Complaint is very rife about the dangerous condition of the roads. It is equivalent to taking one's life in one's hands to pass along some of our "high" roads in a car after dark—or even in daylight—in wet weather. When will the authorities learn that our comparatively narrow roads are unsuited for crown peaks such as at present constructed?

"Anyone who thinks the King of England is only a figurehead is very much mistaken," said Premier G. Howard Ferguson, of Ontario, to an interviewer, after he had audience with His Majesty. The Premier laughed at the suggestion that he might have worn court dress. "I wore the same clothes that I have often worn in Toronto. It was in no sense an official reception. His Majesty was good enough to ask me to go to see him, and there was a complete absence of formality."

"When I got to the Palace and had shaken hands with His Majesty it was just a case of the King saying: 'Come inside and sit down. I want to have a chat with you.' There was nobody else present except the King and myself; that is what made it so pleasant. We could talk with the utmost freedom. It was a frank pleasant talk, but there was nothing lackadaisical or merely conventional about it. It was a real discussion."

"The King is without question the best informed man on Canadian affairs that I have met in England. His Majesty has peculiar problems and features of each province in Canada at his finger tips. Just think of the King knowing about power developments in Ontario and Quebec, and about possibilities in British Columbia, and being able to compare them with costs for development here where they have to burn coal to generate electricity. I was with His Majesty three-quarters of an hour, and it was most delightful and interesting talk on international, imperial and particularly Canadian affairs."

"His Majesty talked about South Africa, New Zealand and Australian affairs also, and about continental conditions. He knew I had just returned from the continent. He showed an intense knowledge of every part of the Empire, and it is quite obvious he is a close student of world affairs and especially of Empire's affairs. His Majesty has got a remarkably forceful personality; it impresses everyone."

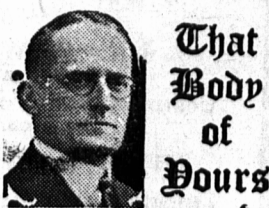
Premier Ferguson concluded by saying it is no wonder that the King has got not only the loyalty but the affection of his people, with whom he is in constant contact.

And he glibly says they can be solved immediately if the people will only listen to what Mr. Deachman tells them and puts his ideas into practice.

Of course there must be some people in Western Canada who know Mr. Deachman. It would certainly be interesting to hear what they may have to say with regard to his writings and particularly to his ideas of financing Canada. Liberal propaganda emanating from the Parliament buildings and published by certain papers as articles written by an independent writer should be taken with a grain of salt. The people of Canada should be told that

YOUR LIVER AND YOUR APPETITE

It is really only a matter of months since what was considered the poorest kind of meat, liver the "poor man's beefsteak" was given away to its employees by wholesale butchers.

To-day calf's liver, in particular, commands a higher price that the choicest cut of beef obtainable. As you know, for many years milk, or dairy products generally, have been the standby of physicians who were endeavoring to build up undernourished children.

One of the problems that faces them is the lack of appetite on the part of these patients. At the Massachusetts General Hospital one fourth of all the undernourished children brought to the clinic gave loss of appetite as the outstanding symptom.

Dr. W. M. Bartlett has compared the gains of weight by different methods, in children who were undernourished by loss of appetite. According to his findings the "most efficient and reliable method of treatment for loss of appetite is the introduction of calf's liver, broiled beefsteak, and lamb's kidneys, into the diet of the child."

He suggests that the calf's liver contains some special substance which increases the appetite or renews it when it is lost.

It has been suggested by Drs. Mendel and Osborne that this substance is Vitamin D, as liver is exceedingly rich in this vitamin.

Now what does this mean to you? That that liver of yours has much to do with your general health, you have always known; its storing of sugar, manufacture of bile, making of blood, removing or poisons from the blood.

However now we find that it is likely a big factor in your appetite, your appreciation and enjoyment of food.

You can spoil its ability to keep your appetite in good order, by your careless habits. These are overeating and under-exercising.

And when you come to think this matter over it certainly comes home to you that when the liver is congested from overeating and lack of exercise, your appreciation of food and in fact your appreciation of everything else in life is much below par.
