W. Forbes, Port Vernon, was in the city yesterday registering at the Queen.

The work of cleaning the streets has been proceeded with to some extent in this city.

The schooner "Laura Cox" arrived at this port yesterday with a full cargo of plained lumber for L. M. Poole & Co.

The schooner "K. McKenzie" arrived in port yesterday morning with a cargo of pine for the McDonald, Rowe, Wood Working Co.

The Fourth Regiment, C. A., have recently received from the Militia Department at Ottawa two more nine pound guns and six limbers, four of the latter belonging to the four guns received by the regiment some time since.

The dainty aroma of mayflowers pervaded the market building yesterday morning from a number of bunches of this beautiful herald of spring which were on sale there. This is rather early in the season for mayflowers and portends an early and mild spring and summer.

The retail market prices and the dealer's prices in this city yesterday were the same as last reported, with the exception of loose hay, which sold at fifty-five to sixty cents per cwt. in the retail market, and black oats, which dealers quoted at forty-four cents a bushel. Pork was quoted from nine to eleven and one-eighth cents a pound, according to quality.

The adjourned hearing in the case of Miller vs Miller in the Vice Chancellors Court was held Thursday, when further witnesses were examined, and evidence taken in Boston on commission read. This is an administration suit to distribute the estate of the late William Miller of Marshfield and to settle the rights and interests of his heirs. The principal contest in it is whether certain moneys paid by deceased in his lifetime to one of his sons in order to purchase a farm for him and to stock it, was an advancement by "portion," or was given in payment of wages due by the father to the son. After addresses by counsel, Court took time to deliver judgment.

Synopsis of Canadian North Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending home-seeker.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on an arm of at least six acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
