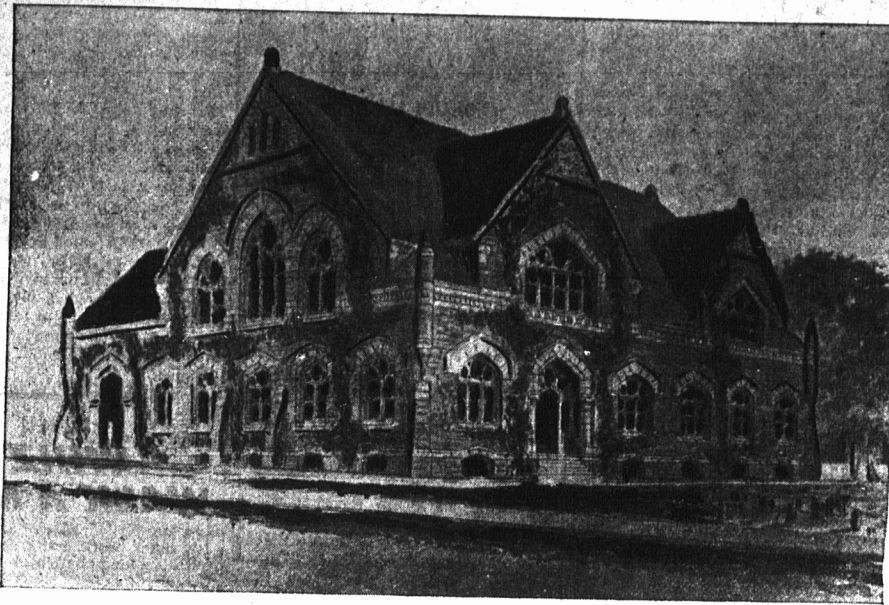

CANADIAN CHEESE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

STRAFORD, Aug. 24.-Hon. Thomas Ball-n yne has arrived home from his trip to Scotland and England. He is in the best of health and enjoyed the trip immensely. Speaking of the dairy trade, he said that demoralization in cheese prices was caused by the old cheese overstocking the new, and preference being given to the old by the consuming public. AN AMERICAN SCHOOL BURNED

At Erzeroum, Armenia, May be an Accident

The Second Burning, a Strange Coincidence - British Admiral Dead, Won American Medal.

BRITISH ADMIRAL DEAD.
LONDON, Aug. 29-(Special)-Vice Admiral W. R. Roland is dead. He once received a gold medal from the American Government for saving part of the crew of the Brig Comers, upset off the Mexican coast.

SCHOOL BURNED IN ERZEROUM.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 29-(Special)-The American school for boys at Erzeroum has been burned, it is believed by an accident.

THE SECOND SCHOOL BURNED.
This is the second American school at Erzeroum destroyed by fire, the institution for girls having been burned July 31st.

A COINCIDENCE.
It is moreover, a singular coincidence that the present fire follows the practical coercion of the Sultan by an American squadron sent to Smyrna to demand among other things the equal treatment by Turkey of American schools with those of other nationalities.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL. SOUTHPORT POST OFFICE.

Sir:-The people of Lct 48 have been deprived of their mail, through the cheese pairing economy of the Govt. We hear much about the large revenue, and general prosperity of the country. But when our postmaster, who has to attend to six forwarding mails, keep his house under the public, and give his time to the office, he receives only fifty-six dollars a year. If he refuse to keep the office at that rate, it is removed to Charlottetown. We must then be deprived of our mail or send to Charlottetown. The Southport office has been shifted from place to place in Southport, until Mr. Murphy was induced to take it with the promise of increased pay. Will it be believed that the increase was only two dollars. Mr. Murphy has fitted his house for the office at considerable expense and given every satisfaction. When our Postmaster General boasts of the prosperity of his Department, we have a right to expect that the people will not be deprived of their mails by starvation pay to local postmasters. It appears that Southport office has not received the same increase as distributing offices, as I understand that they got their pay doubled. How can a man keep fire and light for six o'clock till late at night on such pay. I trust that the pay will be increased to induce Mr. Murphy to take the office at Southport. He has attended to his duty well, and has the only suitable place in Southport. I trust that the present trouble will be remedied at once, both for the credit of the Government, and the convenience of the public.

GREAT BATTLE NEAR LIAO YANG

Three Thousand Russians Slain with Loss of a General and Ten Guns - Russians Retire on Liao Yang - A Strong Position - Will Kuropatkin Retreat Further - Supposed Japanese Plans.

RUSSIAN ARMY RETREATS.
LONDON, Aug. 29-(Special)-The Russian army with its transport and artillery has retired on Liao Yang and fighting is still going on.

RUSSIAN GENERAL KILLED.
Both sides lost heavily in the severe fighting of the last few days.

RUSSIAN POSITION STRONG.
The Russian defences at Liao Yang are believed to be very superior, but it is thought the Japanese may be able to completely surround Kuropatkin's forces there.

LIAO YANG DEFENCES.
The defences consist of strong walls, enclosing a large square area, the walls mounting many guns and being in turn surrounded on three sides by a moat, with earthworks and fortified hills beyond.

RUSSIANS LOST TEN GUNS.
The Russian losses in recent fighting are fully three thousand men and ten guns.

KUROPATKIN'S RETREAT.
The belief in some quarters is that Kuropatkin will continue to withdraw northward fearing the Japanese' attack on HIS WEI TAI.

JAPS MAY CUT THE RAILWAY.
The Japanese are believed to be trying to cut the railroad to Mukden to force Kuropatkin to give decisive battle at Liao Yang.

[The recent battle near Liao Yang has evidently been severe, not improbably ranking, with those of the Yalu, Nan Shan Hill, Ysanko, the Motien Pass and Hai Obang. The numbers engaged were probably greater than any previous engagement, and much greater than in some of the earlier battles. The severity of the fighting is at least by the number of Russians killed, including a general, and the loss of ten guns. The latter loss is significant as in the more recent previous engagements the Russians had carried off their guns even when badly whipped. When this last battle began it was expressed whether it might not be merely a feint. It was evidently a very real and terrible battle.

As the Russian advanced positions when the battle began were some twenty miles from Liao Yang their heavy losses and retreat upon that position shows an undoubted defeat. We do not think Liao Yang will be abandoned without serious fighting. It is too strong and too important to be thus sacrificed, and has been mentioned as the intended winter quarters of the Japanese' armies in the north. It is also significant that notwithstanding the forces recently sent southward to reinforce General Nogi at Port Arthur, the remaining force in the north has proved strong enough to defeat General Kuropatkin's concentrated power. There is nothing later from Port Arthur which is being most heroically defended but apparently must soon surrender.
