ENJOYABLE TRIP.—Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Buntain who were passengers from here to St. John's Newfoundland by the last trip of the S. S. Canadian Sapper, arrived home Saturday evening. They came from St. John's by the Transatlantic Steamer "Sachem" to Halifax and report having spent a very pleasant time, commencing business over the Newfoundland report business conditions at Newfoundland as being good. In addition to very extensive work being done at Cornerbrook St. Johns is now building a large new dry dock which when completed is estimated will cost between one million five hundred thousand and two million dollars. It is expected that this dock will be completed about the first of September of next year in addition to this dry dock they are building a large up-to-date hotel and a very large amount of money is being expended on the streets and roads. The official opening of the Pulp and Paper Mills at Cornerbrook last Monday was a notable event. The passenger traffic over the Newfoundland Railway at this time was so great that it was practically impossible to make any reservations on this railway until the latter part of the week. The capacity of the Pulp Mills at Cornerbrook is 450 tons daily.

Two or three had actual previous war experience. Dr. Bruce, with his long and varied hospital experience and surgical knowledge, unhampered by red tape, and untrammelled in his work owing to the broad terms of his commission was in every sense well qualified for his task. In his report, he had as associates officers of wide hospital and military experience—Col. Walter McKeown, Col. Wallace Scott, Lt.-Col. F. W. E. Wilson, and Lt.-Col. Charles Hunter, who assisted in the inspection, and by whose combined efforts the terms and recommendations of that famous document were formulated.

Despite Sir Andrew Macphail's belated taunts, ninety-nine per cent of the people of Canada retain the implicit faith they have always had in the veracity of the Bruce report, and in the wisdom of the recommendations which, it is significant to add, were in the end adopted practically in toto. The path of reformers is inevitably stormy at the outset and, of course, some high military authorities were annoyed. If some of them could have had their way and public opinion should have been strangled, a court martial would have followed the report of the Balfour Board with a pre-arranged verdict to eliminate Col. Bruce from the scene. But the latter stood to his guns and nothing that Sir Andrew says at this late day diminishes the gratitude of the Canadian people toward Col. Bruce and his committee, for their courageous and unselfish efforts in behalf of our sick and wounded during the Great War. Sir Andrew's antipathy toward all who were concerned with promoting the efficiency of our Army Medical Services is not confined to the Bruce reforms of 1915. An effort that developed subsequent to the mobilization to utilize the experience of the Canadian medical officers who had served in the War, and make it the basis of suggestions for increasing the efficiency of the permanent C.A.M.C. meets with his reprobation and he gloatingly alludes to the shelving of his proposal by the Canadian Medical Association in 1921—totally ignoring the fact of record that the committee was authorized at a former meeting of the Canadian Medical Association (Quebec, 1919) to report direct to the Canadian Government, and that this it did in 1920, receiving the thanks of the then Minister of Militia. The records of the Association are in existence and show that the committee embraced nearly every Canadian medical officer who was distinguished during the War—save perhaps Sir Andrew Macphail himself. An inspection of these names would be conclusive proof to a layman of the folly that was committed by the Canadian Medical Association in 1921, in failing to give
